Tom G. Noll, 62, Bazine, stepfather of Greg Overlease, Norton, died Wednesday at the Rooks County Health Center, Plainville.

Mr. Noll was born Nov. 20, 1944, in Salt Lake City, Utah, the son of Earl and Marge (Husky) Noll. He spent most of his childhood on a ranch in Steam Boat Springs, Colo., until he graduated from high school. He graduated from mechanic school in Denver, Colo., and went to work for a Jeep dealership. Later he taught at the same school he attended and then worked for a Chevrolet dealership in Denver.

He moved to Oakley and worked for a Chevrolet dealership there and later a farmer in Winona. He moved to Scott City and worked for an implement dealership as a parts manager. Later he worked as a parts manager for Wright's Chevrolet in Scott City and worked his way up to shop foreman after the dealership was sold and the name changed to Spangler Car and Truck Center.

After many years in Scott City he moved to Ness City and went to work for Cheyenne Oil Company. Mr. Noll worked there until being diagnosed with cancer in February.

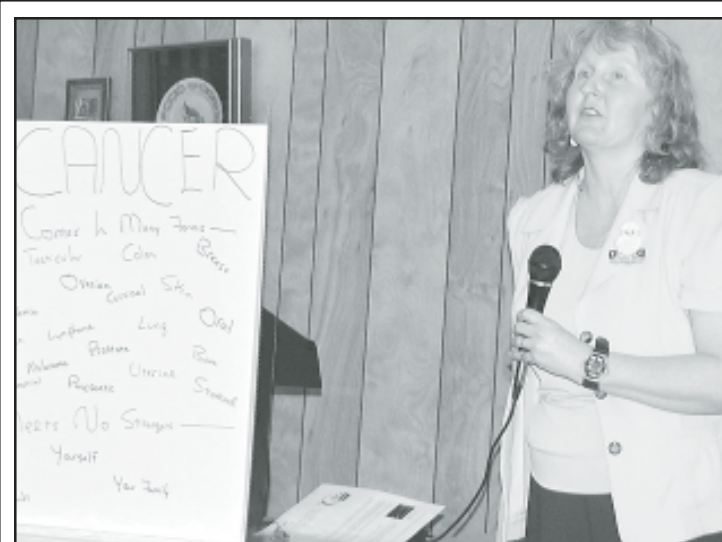

Organizer relates relay to life of cancer patient

The Norton Lions Club heard a presentation by Relay for Life organizer, Sara Durham, at the April 3 meeting. Relay for Life is a nationwide fund raiser to assist the American Cancer Society in cancer research.

Mrs. Durham told the club that the theme for this year's relay is "Super Heroes." She encouraged the club to form a team and be one of the 20 teams entered in the relay to be held from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. June 22 and 23.

She said that starting the relay at dusk symbolizes the time a person receives the diagnosis of cancer. As the evening goes on it gets colder and darker, just as the emotions of the cancer patient does. The hour between 1 to 2 a.m. represents when treat-

ment starts. Some may become sick, not wanting to go on, maybe wanting to give up, just like walkers in the relay. Around 4 to 5 a.m., the end of the relay is near, just as it is in treatment. They can see the light at the end and know that life will go on. The morning light brings a new day. She urged people, as they leave the relay, to think of the cancer patient leaving their last treatment.

The entry fee for the relay is \$10 per person. She said the goal for the Norton Relay for Life is \$20,000. Each of the 20 teams is urged to raise \$1,000 per team. She said if someone can't be on a team but wants to help, they can purchase a luminary for \$10 as a memorial.
