ited. Tobacco products, she said, include, but are not limited to, cigarettes, cigars and smokeless tobacco. School property includes all real property, including parking lots and athletic facilities, and personal property, including vehicles, which are owned, leased or rented by or for the district.

Mrs. Menagh said people who are caught using tobacco products will be asked to stop. If they don't comply, she said they will be asked to leave and if they continue to refuse to comply or leave, then the district has the option to call the police.

Students who violate the policy will be disciplined according to the regulations in the student handbook and the policies of the

Mrs. Menagh said they received a grant to pay for writing the policy, signs to hang up and cards to pass out, quitting information, and publicity.


