

School district's concrete

Committee recommends deed transfer for Manor

The Norton City Council will be receiving a request from the Finance Committee to deed the property the Norton Manor's car port is on to the Norton Housing Authority.

The property needs to be deeded to the housing authority because it receives money from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), which requires it.

City Administrator Rob Lawson asked if it was just the property the car port is on that needs to be deeded.

City Attorney Karen Griffiths said it was. She said the city also owned the property south of the Manor, across the street.

Mr. Lawson said he had been trying to contact HUD to get Horace Greeley Ave. released to the city. That way, he said, the city will be responsible for maintaining it, not the housing authority.

Councilman Ron Briery, who is on the Finance Committee, asked Mrs. Griffiths if the quitclaim deed needed to go through

the full council. She said it did; this is something the council needs to approve.

Some of the Norton School District's concrete will be getting a face-lift.

At a special meeting to look at bids for concrete work Monday afternoon, Superintendent Greg Mann told the Norton School Board that they received one bid for concrete work from Scott Evans Contracting.

The bid, which totaled \$54,982.50 for four areas, was about \$15,000 less than the board budgeted, he said.

The four projects are:

• the south half of the north high

school/junior high parking lot for \$40,000, which includes curb, gutter, slab, and sidewalk work;

• curb, gutter and sidewalk work at Eisenhower Elementary for \$1,920;

• gutter and sidewalk work on the north side of the Memorial Gymparking lot and the south side of the boiler room for \$\$4,647.50; and

• the Bishop driveway slab in the south high school parking lot for

BB gun team wins state championship

The Norton County Rotary BB Gun team lived up to their long winning tradition by earning the championship of the 42nd annual Kansas Jaycees State BB Gun Championships on Saturday in Manhattan and receiving a berth in the upcoming international

Norton has now won the state shoot 37 times and the international shoot eight times, more than any other team in the world.

The top three teams from each state shoot qualify for competition in the Daisy/Jaycees International BB Gun Championships which will be held again this year in Bowling Green, Ky., on June 29 through July 1.

The Norton Yellow team won the championship with a shooting score of 1,820 and written test score of 462 for a total score of

Placing second was the Manhattan Purple team with a shooting score of 1,756 and written test score of 468 for a total score of 2,224. In third place was the Ark City No.1 team with a shooting score of 1,726, written test score of 416 and total score of 2,142.

The Wyandotte County team had a total score of 2,222, which would have placed them in third place but the entire team was com
