WEEKLY SERMONETTE

"Is Memorial Day just another day off?" Rev. Ray Gilstrap, Almena, Clayton & Norcatur United Methodist churches

Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ. My prayer for you today is that you may approach Memorial Day this year with a spirit of joy and celebration, not one of mourning. And that you may have God's Word hidden in your hearts in song.

I'd like to begin by quoting from a May 29, 2005, 60 Minutes commentary by Andy Rooney. "Tomorrow is Memorial Day, the day we have set aside to honor by remembering all the Americans who have died fighting for the thing we like the most about our America: the freedom we have to live as we please." Rooney continues by sharing stories about friends who died in WW II and those they left behind. Then he makes one of those true statements we don't like to hear: "For too many Americans, Memorial Day has become just another day off....the men, boys really, who died in our wars deserve at least a few moments of reflection during which we consider what they did for us.

We use the phrase, "gave their lives", but they didn't give their lives. Their lives were taken from them. There is more bravery at war than in peace, and it seems wrong that we have so often saved this virtue to use for our least noble activity, war. The goal of war is to cause death to other

Mentioning a few more of his personal friends who died in the war, he again refers to Memorial Day. "I won't think of them anymore tomorrow, Memorial Day, than I think of them any other day of my life. Remembering doesn't do the remembered any good, of course. It's for ourselves, the

I wish we could dedicate Memorial Day, not to the memory of those who have died at war, but to the idea of saving the lives of the young people who are going to die in the future if we don't find some new way some new religion maybe
