The Norton County Wheat Plot Tour will be held at 7 p.m. on Thursday. Tim Schulze is this year's host. To get to the plot, go three miles west of Norton on U.S. 36 to the intersection of County Road W-3, then go one mile north to County Road L and go west 3/4 mile.

Brian Olson, northwest research and extension agronomist, will go over the varieties included on the tour. Erick DeWold, K-State plant pathologist, will discuss wheat diseases, and Dan O'Brien, K-State ag economist, will evaluate the wheat markets. Alana McGough from the Kansas Crop Improvement Association will also be on hand to talk with farmers.

*Driver's license
renewals kept
in counties*

County residents will still be able to renew their driver's licenses at the Norton County Treasurer's Office. Treasurer Cindy Linner said county offices will retain their ability to renew regular driver's licenses and process new and renewed identification cards. There was worry that county offices would no longer be able to do this.

In a press release, Congressman Jerry Moran said the proposed federal regulations governing the 2005 Real ID Act would allow county treasurers to offer this service as long as specific security standards were followed. The act sets uniform security features for licenses and requires a state to verify the identities of an applicant. The act was to take effect in May, with a federally granted extension of 19 months.

Mr. Moran said the states are not bound to follow the rules of the act, but could lose federal funding if they don't.

Mrs. Linner said the security standards have not been completely defined yet, but treasurers' offices across the state are being allowed to

Lightning strike thought to be fire's cause

A Norton woman's home was not seriously damaged when lightning struck it last Thursday.

Rural Fire Chief Steve Otter said the fire was believed to have been started at the home of Rosalie McMullen on Eagles Road Thursday afternoon when lightning struck an antenna and then traveled through the electrical system to ignite the wall insulation in the basement.

He said it took 13 firemen in four trucks from the Norton County Rural Fire Department about an hour to put the fire out, clear the smoke and make sure everything

Since Memorial Day weekend kids and parents have been enjoying the cool blue waters of the Norton Swimming Pool.

Pool manager Jill Lively said the swimming season has gotten off to a good start since it opened last Monday.

"It's been good so far," she said.

She said they had to close early Thursday and were closed Friday because of the weather.

Mrs. Lively said the pool will be open Monday through Thursday, 1 to 5 p.m. and 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., and Friday through Sunday, 1 to 8 p.m.

To get in to the pool, swimmers have the option of buying a \$1.50 day pass or seasonal passes at \$30 for a single person or \$75 for a family. Or, she said, they can buy a 20-punch card for \$25.

Cheri Brooks will be holding swimming lessons again. Enrollment for lessons was held last week, but swimmers can still enroll by calling Mrs. Brooks. There will be a \$5 fee for the late enrollments.

The first session will be June 18-29 and the second session will be held July 2-13. The cost of each session is \$15.

undergoes a
name change*

TimeSaver at the intersection of US Highway 36 and Highway 283 in Norton will undergo a name change. The store is one of 10 convenience stores in Kansas and Nebraska recently acquired by Pester Marketing Company, Denver, Colo.

Area supervisor, Marianne Dix, Stockton, said the store will no longer be branded to Shell, but will become a 1st Stop.

Ms. Dix said local employees will stay the same but new signage will appear by mid-July. She also said the sign on the front of the store is slated to come down soon.

Ruth Winters, the local store manager, said there are six employees at the store. She said a new canopy will be installed along with a new driveway and the front of the building will be updated.

A company press release said there will be an increase in groceries, health and beauty aids, beverages, lottery and tobacco products. The release also said 1st Stop will introduce its premium JavaStop coffees as well as other cold and hot food offerings.

They used the Norton City Fire Department's thermal imaging camera, which responds to heat, to check for "hot spots" and to make sure all of the burning material was extinguished.

The damage, he said, was minimal and was primarily smoke damage. Water damage was very light and the rest of the damage was mostly light cosmetic damage.
