

## <u>HANSEN MUSEU</u>

The Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum takes great pride in bringing to Logan the exhibit "Married to Adventure", photographs from the travels of Martin and Osa Johnson. "Married to Adventure," recounts the daring world travels of Martin and Osa Johnson as illustrated by their unprecedented photographs and writings.

Taking adventure travel up a notch, in 1932 the Johnsons purchased two Sikorsky amphibian airplanes. The planes, a zebra-striped twin engine S-38 named Osa's Ark and a giraffespotted single engine S-39 named Spirit of Africa were shipped from the states to South Africa, then reassembled and readied for an unprecedented aerial safari. Despite 4,400 miles of dense fog, heavy rains, mountainous terrain, and expensive but nearly useless maps, the Johnsons and their crew reached Kenya on Feb. 8, 1933. Using Nairobi as a base of operations they were able to coordinate their trips across east Africa. The "Flying Safari", which involved traveling 60,000 miles and stretched the length of Africa from Cape Town to Cairo, is covered in Martin's classic 1935 book, "Over African Jungles" and in their movie, "Baboona", released in the same flying bug, the Johnsons put Osa's giraffe airplane the Spirit of Africa and Borneo and headed back to British North Borneo which they had first visited in 1920. After making the first flight over the North Borneo interior and filming Mt. Kinabalu, the tallest mountain in all of Southeast Asia, Martin and Osa established a base near Abai on the banks of the Kinabatangan River. The sporty S-39 proved to be an invaluable expedition tool and the 3,000 photos and 150,000 feet of film Martin was able to shoot, thanks to it, is widely considered the technical finest of his entire career.

Many of those women were also working outside their homes for the first time in their lives and raising children on their own, while fighting loneliness and the fear that their husbands might never return.

The American Woman's Cookbook put out a Victory edition with a section of "ration recipes", as the cooks of the day termed them. A dedication to General Douglas MacArthur pledged the women of America to do their part to help win the war by economizing and keeping up family spirits. Could we use a little of that spirit today at the gasoline tank as well as at the kitchen stove?

#### THE VICTORY COOKBOOK'S SCALLOPED PEACHES

One cup sliced, peeled peaches

Four cups sliced, peeled apples

One-fourth teaspoon salt, one teaspoon allspice

One-fourth cup brown sugar One-fourth cup stale bread crumbs, fine

One-fourth cup water

Arrange a layer of half the peaches in bottom of a greased baking dish, arrange half the apples over them and sprinkle with salt, repeat with remainder of fruit, spread the sugar over the top, sprinkle on the crumbs and pour water carefully over all. Bake at 350 degrees for forty minutes. Serve warm with a bit of cream or ice cream if available. Will serve six. Other fruits may be substituted, plums, apricots, rhubarb, but must use peaches with them for their sweetening power.

#### **MOCK SAUSAGES**

Three cups cooked lima beans (big butter beans) Two-thirds cup rye bread crumbs

Three eggs

Two tablespoons fat — bacon grease if possible Half a teaspoon each of sage, salt and coarse ground pepper

Mash beans until very smooth, add in flavorings, form into eight sausage rolls about three inches long. Roll in bread crumbs, then in beaten egg, then crumbs again. Saute in hot fat until brown. Serve with eggs or cheese to complete the protein.


