HANSEN MUSEUM

The Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum takes great pride in bringing to Logan the exhibit "Married to Adventure", photographs from the travels of Martin and Osa Johnson. "Married to Adventure," recounts the daring world travels of Martin and Osa Johnson as illustrated by their unprecedented photographs and writings.

Taking adventure travel up a notch, in 1932 the Johnsons purchased two Sikorsky amphibian airplanes. The planes, a zebra-striped twin engine S-38 named Osa's Ark and a giraffe-spotted single engine S-39 named Spirit of Africa were shipped from the states to South Africa, then reassembled and readied for an unprecedented aerial safari. Despite 4,400 miles of dense fog, heavy rains, mountainous terrain, and expensive but nearly useless maps, the Johnsons and their crew reached Kenya on Feb. 8, 1933. Using Nairobi as a base of operations they were able to coordinate their trips across east Africa. This safari was quite a departure from their earlier ones. With a small African ground crew, they were able to establish a series of basic airfields at strategic points allowing them to reach remote areas of Africa without the large

number of porters required in previous safaris.

The "Flying Safari", which involved traveling 60,000 miles and stretched the length of Africa from Cape Town to Cairo, is covered in Martin's classic 1935 book, "Over African Jungles" and in their movie, "Baboona", released in the same year. Having sufficiently caught the flying bug, the Johnsons put Osa's Ark in dry dock, rechristened the giraffe airplane the Spirit of Africa and Borneo and headed back to British North Borneo which they had first visited in 1920. After making the first flight over the North Borneo interior and filming Mt. Kinabalu, the tallest mountain in all of Southeast Asia, Martin and Osa established a base near Abai on the banks of the Kinabatangan River. The sporty S-39 proved to be an invaluable expedition tool and the 3,000 photos and 150,000 feet of film Martin was able to shoot, thanks to it, is widely considered the technical finest of his entire career.

War effort supported on the home front

During World War II every American was firmly behind the war effort and did whatever they could to help. All sorts of commonplace things were in high demand and short supply. Ration stamps were issued by the government in an attempt to equalize distribution. Shoes, however, were hard to find even if you had the ration stamps to qualify. Leather was needed for combat boots. Wool and cotton went for uniforms — women remodeled and revamped old clothes and wore them another year... and then another. No stockings — seams up the back of bare legs were drawn with eyebrow pencil. Gasoline and tires were essential to our troops, so back home patriotic Americans walked, rode bikes, curtailed trips and drove on tires so bald they popped at a chip of sharp gravel. Children helped by collecting foil from gum wrappers, cigarette packages and empty toothpaste tubes for the aluminum collection barrel at the Courthouse.

Everyone who could find a plot of ground planted a Victory garden to supplement the many foods that were rationed. Sugar was scarce as hen's teeth and only the cheaper, tougher grades of meat were available in the markets. All the sacrifices were made cheerfully because they were for "our boys". Would that we were so solidly behind the troops today.

Mama worked behind the counter in Grandpa Cafferty's grocery store. Occasionally I was al-

lowed to go along. I remember people coming in literally begging for sugar even though their ration stamps were all used. Bananas were a rare treat, always in high demand. And if you wanted good meat, better live on a farm and butcher your own animals IF you could keep one back from government requisition officers. A lot of meatless meals and meat substitutes were invented by creative women. Many of those women were also working outside their homes for the first time in their lives and raising children on their own, while fighting loneliness and the fear that their husbands might never return.

The American Woman's Cookbook put out a Victory edition with a section of "ration recipes", as the cooks of the day termed them. A dedication to General Douglas MacArthur pledged the women of America to do their part to help win the war by economizing and keeping up family spirits. Could we use a little of that spirit today at the gasoline tank as well as at the kitchen stove?

THE VICTORY COOKBOOK'S SCALLOPED PEACHES

One cup sliced, peeled peaches
 Four cups sliced, peeled apples
 One-fourth teaspoon salt, one teaspoon allspice
 One-fourth cup brown sugar
 One-fourth cup stale bread crumbs, fine
 One-fourth cup water

Arrange a layer of half the peaches in bottom of a greased baking dish, arrange half the apples over them and sprinkle with salt, repeat with remainder of fruit, spread the sugar over the top, sprinkle on the crumbs and pour water carefully over all. Bake at 350 degrees for forty minutes. Serve warm with a bit of cream or ice cream if available. Will serve six. Other fruits may be substituted, plums, apricots, rhubarb, but must use peaches with them for their sweetening power.

MOCK SAUSAGES

Three cups cooked lima beans (big butter beans)
 Two-thirds cup rye bread crumbs
 Three eggs
 Two tablespoons fat — bacon grease if possible
 Half a teaspoon each of sage, salt and coarse ground pepper
 Mash beans until very smooth, add in flavorings, form into eight sausage rolls about three inches long. Roll in bread crumbs, then in beaten egg, then crumbs again. Saute in hot fat until brown. Serve with eggs or cheese to complete the protein.
