Mr. Nieves became fascinated with reptiles and amphibians at the age of eight growing up in Bellevue, Neb. Now, he travels to other countries to research and photograph his favorite subjects. He has also authored two children's books: "Reptiles Up Close" and "More Reptiles Up Close". His next book, "Amphibians Up Close" will soon be released.

Local bank adds ATM

to services

Bank President Karl Kohfeld said the bank bought the property on the corner of U.S. 36 and Second Avenue about three weeks ago. The property belonged to Lottie and Wayne Wiltfong.

The bank had the old building torn down to make way for a drivethrough ATM machine. They will also be planting grass and landscaping the area.

'This is a service we want to offer to our customers and the community," he said. "The industry is moving more toward credit and debit cards. Technology is advancing and this is a convenience we want to give to our customers."

Mr. Kohfeld said they bought the property because the location was ideal and would provide easy accessibility to the bank's customers.

He said they expect the project to be finished in 45 to 60 days.

Norton library ranks fourth in state for service

Norton County residents will be glad to know their libraries are doing a good job. They have been recognized in an index ranking Kansas public libraries on how well they serve their communities. The index is compiled by Steve Read, director of McPherson Public Library.

Libraries are ranked according to the size of the community they serve and compared to all libraries in the state.

Among libraries serving 2,500 to 3,999 people, Norton Public Library ranked fourth, serving 300 to 499 people; Almena City Library ranked thirty-second; and

serving up to 299 people, Lenora ranked twenty-second.

Other area libraries ranked were: Sunshine City Library, Prairie View, fifteenth; Jennings City Library, nineteenth; Norcatur Public Library, thirtieth; and Logan Public Library, sixteenth.

Every year, each library in the state of Kansas, files a statistical report. This report contains the daily records that keep track of traffic in and out of the library. It details the number of items checked out every day. Nowadays libraries check out not only books, but videos, audio cassettes and DVDs. Included in the annual report

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Cattle killed in truck accident

Sheriff's Deputy Scott Bohl said a semi-truck loaded with 44 head of cattle failed to negotiate the turn from Kansas Highway 383 onto U.S. 36 at 2:25 a.m. Tuesday. Four head of cattle were killed in the wreck. Local farmers and ranchers were called upon to help round-up and contain the remaining 40 head. Officer Bohl said it was a real rodeo for awhile, but with the help of portable livestock panels, horses, pickups and trailers, the animals were contained. Director Wade Carter said he plans to attend law school this fall and has told the board he will be leaving sometime in August. He has been accepted into the law program at the University of Missouri in Kansas City.

He hasn't turned in his resignation yet, but wanted to give the board a "heads up". He's hoping they will get someone hired before he has to leave, and so hasn't set a specific departure date yet.

Mr. Carter said they have received three applications for the position so far. The deadline to send in resumés is June 15. The board, he said, will be reviewing the applicants after that.
