Reward offered to catch vandals

A reward is being offered to find whoever is responsible for knocking over several headstones in Lenora.

Lenora City Clerk Gayle James said 16 headstones were knocked over in the oldest part of the Lenora East Cemetery sometime in June. The headstones were fine on June 7, but a woman and her grandchildren recently found them knocked

Mrs. James said most of the graves no longer have anyone living in the area to \$1,000 reward for information leading to

take care of them.

"Most of these people died in the late 1800s or early 1900s," she said. "The thing that makes me maddest is Fannie LeShell's grave was one of them. She was going home from a dance to avoid unwanted attentions and was stabbed to death in front of the Barbeau House. Now, over 100 years later, someone tips over her tombstone. It's like she was violated all over again. She was 21 when she died

Mrs. James said they are offering a

the arrest and conviction of anyone who

was responsible. "We need to catch people who do this

kind of thing and punish them," she said. "This isn't just a prank; it's a big deal." She said the Norton County Sheriff's

Department will be trying to contact any family members who are still alive.

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Six people have so far responded to our call a few weeks back to let us know who they favor for the 2008 presidential nomination and subsequent election.,

Farmer's Market begins next week

The Norton County Farmer's Market will start next week. The first market will be on Thursday,

June 28. It will run twice each Thursday, first from 7 to 9 a.m. and then again from 6 to 8 p.m. The market will be near the main west entrance to Elmwood Park, south of the trees. It will be held every Thursday morning until the first killing frost in the fall.

Beginning Thursday, July 12, an open air market will be held in conjunction with the Farmer's Market once a month. On these days, both markets will be held in downtown Norton west of the courthouse.

The Farmer's Market allows local produce growers an opportunity to offer their goods to the public. The mission of the market is to encourage private venders the opportunity to produce and sell locally grown vegetable produce and baked goods. A good variety of vegetables, produce and baked goods have been available. The season may be a little slow to produce early but as the weeks go by there always seems to be enough produce around.
