## Fireworks Show 2007 said biggest yet

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The biggest fireworks display in the 11year history of the Fourth of July celebration at Sebelius Reservoir came off without a hitch Wednesday night.

Licensed pyrotechnician, Russ Erbert has been coordinating fireworks displays for 14 years. He has been responsible for the displays at the lake since they started. Of this year's display he said, "Everything went off when it was supposed to."

"I really appreciate the crew who worked with me this year. Some of them have helped me for years," he said. His crew consisted of Karla Reed, Dan Hazlett, Steve Meese, Travis Chisham, Larry Nelson, Joyce Quinn, Mike Barrett, Tim Kelly, Jim Sharp, Harold Shinn, Wally Burton and Mick Kier.

"Ninety-nine point nine percent of the display is fired electronically," he said.

"But, a few are still fired manually." "Safety is a big issue," he said. "We all wear hard hats and safety glasses."

He said, "Up close where we're sitting,

it's quite a show. And, loud, too." Following the show, he and his crew policed the area cleaning up debris from the explosives. Thursday morning he made one more sweep of the area just to be sure there were no unexploded rounds missed in the dark. He said he was tired, "But, it's all worth it."
