July is officially National Ice Cream Month. But I suspect there are a lot of folks that share my father's opinion that any month will do! Every summer Sunday night, Mama, Daddy and I walked to the Heap'm Up in Hill City for our weekly ice cream treat. Mama ate orange sherbet, I had Chocolate Revel and Dad chose Rainbow, which consisted of the lashings and scrapings from all the containers. You know, of course, that he chose it because he got two dips for the price of one, which he explained to me many times. My first lesson in economics.

Homemade ice cream was often served at the farm when we went to visit Henry and Amelia Albertson. Their cows provided the cream and the men provided elbow grease. No tabletop ice cream machines, no even electric freezers in those days, just a wooden bucket rigged with a crank on the top of a metal gallon can. They cranked and packed down the delectable delight while Mama and Amelia put dinner on the table. By midafternoon dessert was ready to be served, along with one of Amelia's feather light angelfood cakes and homegrown strawberries from Mama's garden patch.

Another memorable homemade

ice cream occasion was the annual cake and ice cream social that greeted the newbies on the high school faculty. It originated with Gerald and Avola Travis and was intended to bond the old and new faculty members into a team. It worked well — some of the group we met that night remained our dear friends for years. Faculty couples brought in freezers of ice cream — vanilla, banana, peach, chocolate — and Mrs. Travis baked half a dozen different cakes. We all put away a lot of calories but Dave Stuewe could eat more cake and ice cream than anyone I've ever known before or since!

Dorothy and Roger Brown owned a two and a half gallon freezer, so they often brought banana or peach so there'd be enough to go 'round. Here is Dorothy's recipe:

Go dig that ice cream freezer out of the basement and let's have a treat to celebrate National Ice Cream Month!

DOROTHY BROWN'S ICE CREAM

Fourteen eggs, beat hard and add Eight cups of sugar and beat until yellow and foamy One and a half quarts heavy cream is stirred into the eggs with Eight tablespoons real vanilla and one and a half teaspoons salt Pour into the can of a two and a half gallon ice cream freezer and fill can up with whole milk. (Takes a gallon and a half, more or less). Fill to within two and a half inches of the top. Pack the lidded container in the wooden bucket in a slush of three parts ice to one part rock salt and start cranking. This amount takes about 45 minutes of cranking, so have a friend standing by. When crank gets really hard to turn, pack down tight with more ice, cover freezer with a blanket or rug and allow to cure for about an hour.

Flavors: To the egg/cream mix add one of the following to make flavored ice cream — one cup of mashed bananas, strawberries, or fresh peaches (or a combination of any two) For chocolate, add one can of chocolate syrup. To make butter brickle add a tablespoon of butter flavoring and a cup of grapenuts cereal. Or add one cup of chunky peanut butter.

Need a smaller batch? Here is a recipe from LeRoy's Aunt Marguerite — she claims to have used it for 50 years of family feeding.

AUNT MARGUERITE'S ICE CREAM

Eight eggs, beaten well One teaspoon lemon extract One tablespoon real vanilla extract One pint whipping cream Two and a half cups sugar Beat all in a mixer and pour into one gallon freezer can. Fill to within two and a half inches of top with whole milk. Freeze, pack and cure as given above.
