Miss Kansas speaks out on bullying

Alyssa George, this year's reigning Miss Kansas ,was the victim of bullying during her eighth grade year and part of her freshman year of high school. It caused her to speak out about it and, as a result, she launched a public speaking campaign that allowed her to take her message to over 6,000 students.

Now, as Miss Kansas, it is her platform and the message she is taking to Kansas schools.

Wednesday she appeared before students at Lenora Elementary, Eisenhower Elementary, Norton Community High School and Norton Junior High. Miss George brought four students, Skylar Davis, Sabrina Gibson, Drew Schrum and Wyatt Harting to the front of the room and, through role-playing, demonstrated to the other students effective methods of disarming a bully. Her tactics included: broken record (saying the same thing over and over), agreement (agreeing with the bully); just say no; and humor (the hardest to pull off).

Miss George said there are always at least three people involved in a bullying situation: the bully, the target, and the witness. She said 30 percent of chil-(Continued on Page 5)
