'Dream home' part of council tour

 Inspired by a picture of a log cabin, this is a roomy, comfortable mix of rugged cowboy charm and modern conveniences. The home offers four bedrooms and two bathrooms. South-facing windows of the family room flank the fireplace and soar two stories high to offer a spectacular view of their valley home site.
 The focal point of the front room is an iron railing that runs the length of the second floor balcony and down the stairway. Mr. Hardy said, "I told Roger (Roger Fuller of Rawhide Iron Works) I wanted the railing to look like a cowboy cracking a whip driving a herd of longhorns. And, I got what I asked for."
 Ponderosa pine planking lines the walls and ceiling while hickory flooring finishes the study/office. Bulls eye rosette blocks add a decorator touch to all the door frames. Crown moulding finishes every room.
 Mrs. Hardy designed her kitchen to be functional as well as beautiful. The cabinets are hickory, stained a coffee color. A work island with a butcher block top is portable and can be rolled where she needs it. Several cabi-

nets have glass fronts to showcase her dishes. The floor is finished with tile.
 A utility/mud room off the back door makes a handy place for boots and coats. A summer kitchen on the back side of the house offers Mrs. Hardy a convenient place to can garden produce without heating up the rest of the house. She said someone told her it was called a "squaw cooler".
 The outside decor is as attractive as the inside. A blue metal roof sets the house apart from the surrounding landscape. Impressive stone columns support the front porch while a wide, brick-covered, open porch wraps around the south side of the house. The foundation, partial side walls and the massive fireplace are all covered with rounded river rock trucked in from Colorado. The Hardys laughed about their experiences of placing each rock by hand.
 The deck on the north side of the house is made of composite material that will never need any maintenance. A pergola covers the deck and steps lead down to a brick patio. The eye is immediately drawn to an over-sized chiminea made of the same river rock used on the house. The sound of bubbling

water comes from a water feature made from bright blue pottery. It is surrounded by a shallow pool made, again, of the river rock.
 Mrs. Hardy said, "We're both country people and we love living in the country."
 Photography is her hobby and is showcased all over the house. Her husband is her favorite subject and she has captured him riding horses and roping cattle. He added the finishing touches by framing the pictures in rustic wood.
 The couple have six children, Seth, Jason, Ty, Nathan, Amy and Kristin and one grandchild, Austin Lee.
 The Hardys' home, located four miles south to Road Q and four miles west, will be featured on this year's Homes Tour sponsored by the Norton County Arts Council. The tour is scheduled from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 23. Other homes on the tour are the Burton and Lois Schrum home at 709 West Woodfield and the Tony and Verla Grysch home at 16490 PDR A Road south of town. Arts council memberships will be offered at all three homes, while refreshments will be served at the Schrums.
