County to close unused sand pit

Norton County will be closing a sand pit, now that it is no longer being used.

Roger Sprick spoke to the Norton County Commission at its Sept. 24 meeting about the pit, which the county had been leasing.

Mr. Sprick said he sold the property where the pit is, but it hadn't been closed yet. According to the lease, he said the county was supposed to close it when it was done.

The commission said they would speak to the road and bridge supervisor Tom Brannan and told Mr. Sprick that the county would have the pit closed.

In other business, the commission spoke with:

• Troy Thomson, Norton County Sheriff, who said he had checked into a quote given for the installation and materials on an antenna, which was given to the commission the previous week. No action was taken on the quote.

Sheriff Thomson also spoke to the commission about the contract and grant that the county has with Allied for aerial photography of the county. There has been a lot of discussion on the photography and its quality.

Tom Brannan, Norton County Road and Bridge Supervisor, who received an email from Norm Bowers on the rating of bridges in the state. Norton County received a good grade on its bridges. However, with a new formula that the state is using, it is becoming difficult for smaller counties to get money to build bridges.

Mr. Brannan also gave a report on the maintenance and construction of roads in the county. Discussion was also held on the spraying of county roads and the cost split between the road department and the county. This project would be

He said the chip and seal projects have been finished. The New Almelo, PDRA and Country Club roads were also finished. The commission said they have received reports of a large bump on KQNK Road and asked Mr. Brannan to put a sign next to it.

Mr. Brannan also spoke with the commission to Walt Skrdlant, who had a road concern. Mr. Skrdlant said it is difficult to transport machinery on a country road, which is the only access to the land they are working. Mr. Brannan said the county has tried to work on this road before. But, he said, to correct the problem, the county usually gets the property owner's cooperation. A landowner on one side has not agreed to let the county properly slope the road. The commission said that Mr. Brannan should check the right-of-way and if the landowner doesn't agree, proceed with the right-of-way the county already has.

• Curt Archibald, Norton County Solid Waste Supervisor, who said Rose Transportation is on site to crush the "white" goods. He said Rose Transportation is the firm that has contracted with the white goods for several years.

Mr. Archibald said Geo Core called with a concern about a past billing and has asked the county to look into records from 2006 on contract service.

When farmers or ranchers apoly for 2008 EQIP funding, they will be required to fill out the Kansas EQIP Self-Assessment Worksheet.

"If they plan to apply, they should start the process very soon if they haven't done so already," said Klaege. "The

self-assessment worksheet is an educational tool, providing landowners with a clear indication of what natural resource concerns they have, what they can accomplish, and what they need to do to qualify for the program. "We see the worksheets as a

time-saving and money-saving tool. We envision them reducing the time it takes NRCS to process applications for EQIP. By reducing the federal dollars required to administer the program, more dollars should be available for pro-

EQIP is available to help address the unique circumstances and concerns of limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers, who have natural resource concerns that need to be addressed on their land.

In Kansas limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers may receive a higher payment rate through EQIP for structural and vegetative practices.

"After Nov. 2, NRCS staff will begin evaluating applications received in Kansas. All contracts will be signed and obligated with producers by Jan. 25, 2008," explained Klaege.

The NRCS will evaluate each application and give higher priority to those applications that use cost-effective conservation practices; treat multiple resource concerns; address national, state, or local priorities; and provide the most environmental benefits.

Kansas received over \$23.9 million in 2007, and over 1,600 contracts were funded. More than 2,900 applications were received.

In Kansas, EQIP funds will help farmers and ranchers install conservation practices that improve and protect Kansas's priority natural resource concerns.

"The objective of EQIP is to address natural resource concerns through the application of improved conservation systems. EQIP is an environmental enhancement program," said


