The fire safety demonstration was facilitated by Danny Carmen and Trevor Hammond from Northwest Fire Safety, Colby. They instructed the students to remember "PASS" -Pull, Aim, Spray, Sweep. Prairie Land Electric showed the students how to be safe if they are in an accident and the vehicle they are in comes in contact with a power line. Prairie Land Employees Barry Madden, Anna Foley and Kevin Black demonstrated the effects of power lines on kites and balloons. The students were taught the words, "Look up and live." A lawn mower demonstration was presented by Stanton Clark, a FFA member from Northern Valley and Levi Ninemire and Christopher Maddy, Norton FFA. They discussed proper dress for mowing lawns and safety features. Seeing the effects of anhydrous ammonia on chicken livers, brought home the safety message of protective eye wear and rubber gloves.
