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Jays jolt Stockton 49-14

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The final 11-man football game between Stockton and Norton on for 3; Connor Pfannenstiel, 2 for Friday night at Travis Field was a dominating one for the Blue Jays, who won the Mid-Continent League contest by a 49-14 score.

Due to smaller numbers of students, Stockton will begin playing 8-man football in 2008.

Norton, who lost 13-12 at Ellis the week before, arrived at their Homecoming game in a bad mood and the Tigers had to pay. Norton had the ball seven times in the first half and the Blue Jays scored on ter; Jared Cox, tight end; Wes every possession. Stockton, who fumbled the ball away twice and threw two pass interceptions, recorded just two first downs and 11 yards rushing in the first half.

Senior defensive back, tailback Todd Bolt had both pass interceptions and also ran for touchdowns of 55, 15 and 3 yards. Senior quarterback Logan Kats plunged 1 yard for one touchdown and passed 20 yards to senior wide receiver Wes Georgeson for another. Sophomore tailback Zane Perez ran 27 yards for another Blue Jay score and 235 pound senior tackle Zach Mannel hammered into the end zone from 3 yards out for Norton's other touchdown as the Blue Jays led 49-0 at intermission.

The 40 point lead rule started the continuous scoreboard clock with 8:31 left in the first half.

The Norton reserves played the Stockton touchdowns to make ble. the final 49-14.

"We played hard from the opening whistle and executed well on both offense and defense," said Norton head coach Lucas Melvin.

"They did what we thought they would and we stopped both their running and passing."

Norton had 12 first downs and 331 yards of total offense compared to 3 first downs and 104 total offensive yards for the visitors.

Blue Jay running backs averaged 7.2 yards per carry. Leading rusher for Norton was Bolt with 125 yards on 9 carries for a 13.9 vard average. Kats tallied 60 yards on 6 attempts for a 10 yard average. Perez picked up 64 yards on 6 tries for a 10.6 yard average. Other Norton rushers were: Matt Stanley, 3 for 12; Wes Georgeson, Kats was unable to run for two 1 for 4; Mannel, 2 for 5; J.D. First quarter

Gall kicked off for Norton to start the game and Nathan Palmer returned the ball to the 26. Norton was offsides and two incomplete passes later the Blue Jays were offsides again, giving the Tigers a first down on the 37.

Thomas and Dreher limited Tyler Winters to 1 yard and Ray and Dreher stopped Palmer for no gain. Stockton lost 5 yards for delay of game, then quarterback Alex Thornburg took to the air. Kats passed to Cox for a first down on the 24, then Bolt ran around end for a touchdown. Bolt also ran for 2 extra points, making it 14-0 with 6:44 on the clock.

Winters returned Gall's kickoff to the 30. On first down, Thornered on the Stockton 20. Kats passed to Georgeson for Norton's third touchdown of the quarter, then pitched to Bolt for 2 extra points to extend the Jays' lead to 22-0 with 6:27 left.

Cory Post returned Gall's kickoff to the 30. Dreher tackled Winters for a 1 yard loss. Lauer and Stanley tackled Stephan Bellerive for a 3 yard loss. Perez broke up a pass and Stockton punted out of bounds on the Norton 40. Stanley gained 5 yards on 2 plays, then Bolt broke through the line, cut back and was gone on a 55 yard touchdown run. Kyle Edgett kicked the extra point, making it 29-0 with 3:56 left.

Palmer returned Gall's kickoff to midfield, where Gall and Ash-Brock Lauer and Zane Perez ton Draper made the tackle. Robison and Thomas tackled Palmer for no gain. After an incomplete pass, Palmer gained 4 before Kats and Ray made the stop. Stockton punted out of bounds on the Norton 25.
