Horse council checks on funding

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The Norton County Horse Council wanted to make sure the county still has money earmarked for it.

Scott Sproul, who is on the horse council, said at the Oct. 1 Norton County Commission meeting that the council continued to work on raising money for its new restroom/concession project at the equine facility in Elmwood Park.

He said the commission had previously agreed to give the council some money from the Special Park fund for the project. He said he wanted to make sure the money was still marked for the council's project.

Also, he said, as the chairman of the Lenora Jubilee Committee, he sent the county a request for money to be used to build a permanent stage and picnic shelter where the grandstand is now in

The commission said they will discuss the request and give an answer at a later date.

The commission also spoke with:

• <u>Larry Noffsinger, Meritain</u> Health representative, about the county's health insurance. Mr. Noffsinger said his purpose in meeting with the commission was to inform them of Meritain Health's services. If the county is going to take bids for health insurance, he said he would like to submit a proposal. Meritain has offices in Denver and Kansas City and is the largest independent employee health benefits provider in the area, he said. Meritain, he said, is a member of the PPO network, which allows employees to be treated throughout the country.

For prescriptions, Mr. Noffsinger said Meritain used Scrip-

world, who is a pharmacy benefit management provider. He said the important thing to remember about Meritain is that they are an administrator only and that they use a large number of insurance companies to present health insurance coverage to the employees. Meritain works with their customers through partial self-funded employer medical

The commission discussed the pros and cons of partial selffunded policies and what the maximum liability to the county would be. After discussion, the commission agreed to have Norton County employee information and plan coverage mailed to Mr. Noffsinger so that he could put a model plan for the county together.

• Tom Brannan, Norton County Road and Bridge supervisor, who said he recently met with the Furnas County Commission about the availability of gravel or sand in the area. He said from their discussion, it was decided that the location of sand and the availability to Norton County was difficult due to distance. He said they also talked about the roads and their conditions on the Norton/Furnas county line.

• Reggie Beckman, Norton **County Noxious Weed supervisor**, who said they were spraying trees in the road ditches and also spraying a few spots for bindweed. He said the private spraying was nearly finished for the season. Mr. Beckman said he and Mr.

Board certification insures a standard of excellence in knowledge and practice to physicians who, not only certify via the examination process, but who also work to maintain these skills during the seven-year cycle between

To achieve rectification Dr. McKinley had to verify completion of 300 hours of acceptable continuing medical education over the past six years; possess a full and unrestricted license to practice medicine in the United States; and successfully complete a one-day, written examination of knowledge and problem-solving abilities. The exam covered adult medicine, care of newborns. children and adolescents, maternity and gynecological care, community medicine, elder care, human behavior, human behavior and mental health and care of the surgical patient.
