on downtown restoration

The Norton Downtown Restoration Committee recently held a forum to get the public's input on its plans for a park in downtown Norton.

Three members of the committee Gloria Nelson, Judy Holzapfel and Connie Glenn — and 18 members of the community attended the meeting.

The committee presented a rendition of what the Washington Street park would look like. They plan to use old bricks from Main Street for a walkway, plant trees, bushes and flowers, and install lights.

Rawhide Iron Works, presented designs or being used for storage. for fences, two pergolas and iron deco-

rations, which can be hung from street light poles.

The committee also discussed its desire to renovate the buildings downtown. However, at the present time, all renovations will have to be done at the building owners' expense.

Norman Nelson, a member of the Norton County Community Foundation, proposed the question, "What would make businesses come to Norton?"

Kristi Kelley said a big problem for new businesses is finding a place to rent or buy downtown. She said when she started The Mystic Moonstone, she couldn't find a Roger and Linda Fuller, owners of building to rent although many are empty

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Bridge has spent its whole life about six miles northeast of Lenora on Road Y, two miles north of Highway 9. The county would like to let it retire and put a more adequate bridge there, to accommodate the types of traffic and equipment using the roads in the twenty-first century. There's just one problem: The Sand Creek Truss Leg Bedstead Bridge is one of hundreds of metal truss bridges built in Kansas between 1861 and 1939 that were added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1989.

"While these historic bridges can be replaced, they must be moved to a place

The Sand Creek Truss Leg Bedstead that they can be seen by the public," said Diane Becker, Norton County Economic Development Director. "The problem then becomes deciding where the bridge will find a new home."

It didn't take long to find the perfect place for the bridge. A group of fitness walkers living and working in Lenora had long been dreaming of creating a walking path through the wooded area around Lenora's Larrick Park. The trail project and the bridge project came together to create a committee to develop the "Lenora Historic Bridge: A Trail Through Time."

The group intends to start an eight (Continued on Page 5)

The volunteers who train the Norton County Rotary BB Gun team tried a new way to interest young shooters when they hosted a public meeting in the BB Gun Museum on U.S. 36 Highway on Monday evening.

All parents and youths ages 8-14 as of Dec. 31, 2007 were invited and a large crowd was present.

"I was really impressed by the turnout and am pretty excited," said head coach Cameron Archer, who was a Norton shooter when in his teens.

"Out of the 13 youngsters who had never shot a BB gun in competition, we had four really good, natural shooters. All the youngsters seemed to like having a BB gun in their hand and finding out what it is all about. And it's all about learning in the classroom and on the range the rules of safe hunting.'
