Hospital gets the 'go-ahead' for renovation

Although things are still up in the air regarding a remodel of the surgery area, the Norton County Hospital board gave the "go-ahead" to renovate the physical therapy/cardiac rehabilitation area.

Hospital Administrator Rich Miller told the board at its last meeting that previously it had been discussed whether or not it was feasible to move surgery to a different area of the hospital. He said Health Facilities Group has been working with Murray Company to see what was and was not possible.

An architect from Health Facilities

Group said there was no way surgery would work in the lower level of the hospital, nor would it work to build out from the lower level, Mr. Miller said. The architect, he said, suggested the hospital go with the physical therapy area remodel already planned.

Some options they have for surgery, he said, is to add a second level over the out-patient clinic. But, they would need 6,000 square feet and it costs about \$300 a square foot for new construction on a surgery area.

A more realistic idea, said Mr. Miller, was to renovate the current surgery area and extend it into the boiler area. If they

for a couple of weeks. Worst case scenario, he said, was surgery being shut down for the entire length of the project, which is estimated at about six months.

As for the Colby Community College area, which is next to surgery, they would like to enlarge it, so that more students would be able to attend class in Norton. But, Mr. Miller said, they are waiting for solid numbers from the college and are also looking to see if the Dane G. Hansen Foundation will help pay for it.
