seven runners ran well. Two members of the Norton boys team also qualified at the regional meet the week before in Norton and also ran well and finished high.

The top three teams in each regional qualified for the state meet and the Norton girls placed second in the regional. The Norton boys placed fifth in the regional but two runners qualified.

GIRLS

Norton junior Laura Lee Baird was the Lady Jays' top finisher as she placed 11th individually out of 100 runners in the 2.5 mile race with an outstanding time of 16:13.61, which was near her season's best of 16:10. Baird placed seventh among runners on teams. Her time was much better than the 16:41.84 she ran on the same course in the Wamego Invitational at the start of the year.

Second high finisher for the Norton girls was junior KaraJo Jones, who was 32nd individually and 22nd among teams with a time of 17:29.67. Again her time was much better than her clocking of 17:48.40 in the Wamego meet

Freshman Kaylen Rossi was in 18:31.40. Her Wamego meet time was 18:39.19.

Another Lady Jay freshman, Dustyna Sprigg, was fourth best for Norton in 66th place and 44th among team runners with a time of 18:45.12.

Junior Taylor Rossi finished fifth best for Norton to round out the team score. She was 68th individually and 46th among teams with a clocking of 18:46.19.

Also running for Norton were senior Kylie Morel, 85th individually and 61st as a team member, with a time of 19:35.12 and sophomore Amanda Ray, 87th individually and 63rd as a team member,



The second game was tied a number of times before Whitewater broke away from a 13-all deadlock to win 25-18.

Sacred Heart and Whitewater advanced out of pool play along with No.2 seed Hutchinson-Trinity and No.3 seed Silver Lake. In the semi-finals on Saturday,
