Eisenhower receives top marks



School, students earn both excellence, governor's awards

the top schools in the state. Last Wednesday, Superintendent Greg Mann and Eisenhower Principal Corey Roy gathered the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grade classes in the grade school's gym to congratulate

them on their honors. Last year's third, fourth, fifth and sixth grade classes earned four Awards of Excellence for their performances on state assessments. The school also won the Governor's Achievement

Mr. Mann told the students they were given cookies and longer recesses that day because of their performances on the state assessments.

"We want to thank you for your hard work," he said. "That's why you guys got cookies and longer recesses. Your teachers got doughnuts and meat and cheese trays for their hard work."

Eisenhower Elementary, he said, was one of 51 schools out of over 900 in the state to receive Awards of Excellence.

"Give yourselves a hand," he said. This is the second year Eisenhower has earned Awards of Excellence. Last year, the school earned five awards.

But, Mr. Mann said, that is not why they gathered the students.

"You're here now today for being recognized by the governor for being on of the top 54 schools in Kansas,' he said.

He said three things were needed to receive the governor's award.

The first is the school has to meet adequate yearly progress, which involves a bunch of numbers and statistics that they didn't need to get into, he said. Second, he said, the school has to meet the Standard of Excellence, which Eisenhower did in all four grades in both reading and math. And last, he said, the school has to score within the top 5 percent of all the schools in the state.

"You guys are among the top 54 schools in the state," he said. "Third graders, you guys are a part of this now."
