A twelve-foot Christmas tree topped with a golden angel towers in the atrium, bedecked on every branch with giant golden and copper baubles, gold ribbon and white poinsettias. Above, on the poolroom mezzanine, another glorious tree stands and the library also boasts a tree decorated in red and gold. Poinsettias fill every nook and cranny.

A walk down the halls is a little journey through fairyland. Almost every door is a delight to the eye. Wreaths with scarlet bows, a string of sleigh bells to jingle, here's a big sparkly snowflake, there are fat little snowmen standing beside door after door, occasionally Santa or a painted sleigh adorns a corner. My doorway has three angels and greenery hanging with a red plaid bow and shiny red apples. Everywhere you look an arrangement of flowers and greenery cheers our way. Earrings of tinkling bells, tiny wrapped packages, snowmen and Santa faces dazzle from elderly earlobes. A wheelchair-bound resident sports a red and white Santa Claus hat covering his bald spot. My own power chair has a big striped candy cane tied on the back.

Last night a holiday dance was held, live music, fancy desserts and all. Spangles, sequins, golden dancing slippers, sparklies of all kinds came out of closets for the occasion. Even those using walkers and canes trod the light fantastic and wheelchair dancing is all the rage here. Coming up soon is a "family and friends' buffet dinner; everyday conversation is all about who is going where for Christmas Day. Sad to say a few residents will be here alone — but our chef will do a special, elegant dinner for them.

We do not forget the reason for the season, however, even though the corporate office will not allow religious displays. Inside apartments nativity scenes are lovingly arranged, Christmas scripture is read, Advent wreaths are lit, stars and angels and Christmas carols abound. Hearts are full of joy and anticipation as we await the advent of our King. Never, never forget the ONE who put the CHRIST in Christmas. That is the gift beyond all gifts.
