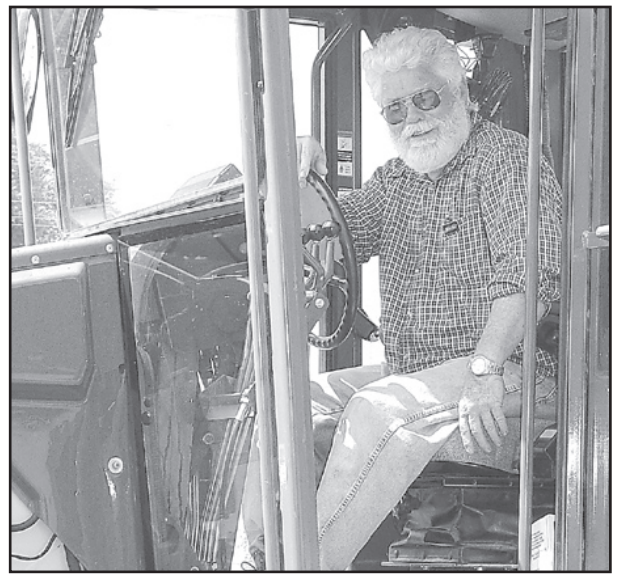
Operator retires after 43 years on the job
