

January: This month, eat three servings a day of whole grain cereals, breads and tortillas, instead of products made with refined enriched flours and grains. February: Eat canned, fresh or

frozen fish eight times this month, or twice a week.

March.: Switch from sweetened drinks to beverages without added sugar this month.


