#### Keeping babies healthy

During the winter months, it can be a challenge to stay healthy when we are indoors most of the day. Keeping children healthy, in group child care settings, is a challenge because each of the children are in contact with many other people, like family and friends, then share cold and flu germs with other children in the child care setting.

A few things to keep in mind: Wash hands, wash hands, wash hands. Children and adults should wash their hands at arrival, before and after eating, after using the toilet and diapering, after wiping noses and faces, after playing outdoors and when departing. Hand washing is the most important way to reduce the spread of infection; especially diarrhea and other contagious diseases among babies and adults.

Eat healthy foods: Be sure children and caregivers eat a balanced diet with fresh fruits and vegetables. Drink plenty of water.

Get lots of rest: Our bodies stay healthy when they are strong and well rested. Adults need 8 hours of sleep and children need more.

Go outside and play: Get plenty of fresh air. Going outside, every day, will help keep immune systems strong. Specific guidelines and tips are provided in the new "The Great Outdoors: Guidelines and Tips for Playing and Learning Outside" brochure you can get from your local R&R.

#### When it's cold outside

Tips for safety when playing outdoors in cold weather: What is considered extreme cold weather depends on the region in which you live, but exposure to any cold weather can pose health risks if precautions are not taken. Cold weather does not mean children aren't exposed to harmful UVB rays from the sun. Be sure to apply sunscreen (minimum of SFR 15) to exposed areas, such as face and ears. Before playing outdoors, be aware of not only apparent temperatures, but also wind chill which will make it feel even colder. For young infants (not mobile), consider excluding from outdoor play, if temperatures are below 40 degrees, because they lose body heat more quickly. If temperatures are below freezing (32 degrees), limit outdoor play to 15-minute increments. Child Care Regulations require 1 hour of daily outdoor play. Meeting this requirement in smaller time increments, due to weather considerations, is acceptable. Children should dress in loose layers for better circulation and so layers con be removed, if the child starts to perspire. Children should wear a hat, a scarf, mittens/gloves, a water-resistant coat and boots. Materials such as polypropylene, wool, and flannel offer the best insulation and help retain body heat. Wet clothes

#### should be removed promptly. Add a little joy to your life

Take a few happiness lessons from the kids in your life-and the kid you once were. Here's a short refresher course. Start smallhappy people enjoy simple things like, a sunny day or having lunch with a friend. They also take less for granted, and they're more grateful. People who regularly take note of the positive things in their lives feel more overall satisfaction, more connection with others, and greater optimism than those who focus on their burdens. Listen to your body-adults can profit especially when it comes to getting enough rest. Americans get way too little sleep, and sleep is important. Be creative-one of the hallmarks of creative activity is the feeling of flow-losing track of time

because you're so involved in what you're doing. If you experience flow, whether it's while you're amusing your child or cooking a meal, that's creative.

#### **Health and Safety**

Healthy hand washing: If you have not done so already. Now is a good time to help your children develop healthy hand washing habits. Proper hand washing can prevent the spread of many communicable diseases. Water alone, however, won't kill germs. Soap is needed, too. Drying the hands with a disposable paper towel will help shop the spread of germs. Here are some appropriate occasions for your child to practice hand washing: When he comes into the house after playing outdoors; after using the toilet; after petting an animal; before eating food. Good habits-learned earlycan last a lifetime. So help your child develop the good habit of washing his hands.

#### **Games and Activity**

I See Something: There are times-waiting in the doctor's office, sitting in a bus-that are boring. Here's a game to play anywhere, anytime that time drags. It teaches children to get information by asking good questions. Say: "I SEE SOMETHING". (It has to be something you can both see). Then give a clue: "It's on your head," is pretty easy. "It's made of leather," is harder. "It's red and square," may be pretty tough. It's bright when it's on and dark when it's off," is a kind of riddle. If one clue isn't enough, add another: "It's red and square and soft." "It's red and square and soft and I'm leaning against it." Children just starting on this game have no good strategy for getting the answer. They look around and guess wildly. So, when it's her turn to see something, listen to her first clue but then ask questions of her that will help her develop strategies.

The Block Book: Blocks are self-education tools for young children to use in play and aid in the development of multiple skills. What can children learn through playing with blocks? Science: space, direction, predicting, observing, comparing and classifying are just some of the scientific processes used by children playing with blocks. Math: shapes, height, weight, number of blocks, patterns, classification and measurement. Social Studies: awareness of the ability to represent places in another way with concrete three-dimensional materials is the beginning of map making. Dramatic Play: social interactions, creating the context of play, relating to real life and working with others in cooperation with the same play theme. So, set out the blocks and just let the children play. Playing with blocks engages children's minds, hands, and imaginations!

### **Books**

Library Corner: Black Meets White. This book is a simple, but engaging, pop-up book that tells the story of when black met white. It is the story of two opposites that make lots of interesting combinations (polka dots, checkerboards, stripes, wiggles and more), when they come together. The book is aimed at younger ages, but I think readers of all ages will be able to take something from the story.

Penguin Stories: Welcome to the South Pole! Read a penguin story. Cover the floor and furniture with old sheets. Provide a basket of mittens for your child to wear while you read. Then put in a few stuffed penguins for company.


