

## Almena man gets New Year surprise

For most people, the new year brings life-improving resolutions that usually aren't followed up on. But for one Almena man, the new year brought joy and surprise when he found out he had an unknown family ready and willing to welcome him with open arms.

Mike Barrett was adopted when he was six-months old from an orphanage in Edmonton, the capital city of Alberta, Canada. His adopted parents, Harold and Dolores Barrett, who also adopted a daughter, Suzie, from the same orphanage about five years later, raised him and his sister in Littleton, Colo., and didn't tell Mike he was adopted until he was around 13 or 14 years old.

"It was always sort of hush hush," he said. "We didn't really talk about it much. The only thing they told me was that I was adopted in Canada and that's where my birth parents lived."

After Mike and his wife, Tina, were married 16 years ago, they looked on the Internet to see if they could find anything about Mike's birth family. It turned out to be a fruitless search, but one Tina felt was important.

"Finding out about his birth family was something that I thought would complete him," Tina said. "It was important. But we never could find anything about a Michael R. Barrett."

The reason for that was because Mike was not born Michael, but was born John Tuck. His adoptive parents had his name changed on his birth certificate. The Barretts didn't find this crucial information out until New Year's Day, when they

## 'Safe ride' program goes well

The Norton City Council's version of "Safe Ride" on New Year's Eve went

At last week's council meeting, City Administrator Rob Lawson said the local taxi company submitted a bill for \$235. The taxi service charges \$5 a ride

Assistant Police Chief Jeremy Hartwell said about 50 people used the taxi service. Some of them took the taxi when they went out as well as home, so that they didn't have to leave their cars anywhere overnight.

City Attorney Karen Griffiths said she had called all of the establishments in town to let them know about the city paying for taxi rides on that night. They all thought it was a great idea, she said, and told her they would promote it, so that people got home safely.

Councilman Jerry Jones said he thought it was an excellent idea and that they will have to look at other times to do it.

Officer Hartwell said he had a lot of

positive comments on it. DUI (driving under the influence) arrests

that night. Officer Hartwell said they only had one, and he didn't live in the county.

In other business, the council:

• Discussed the new seat belt law. Officer Hartwell said before the change in January, the police could pull people over if they saw that a child under 14 wasn't buckled in. They couldn't and still can't pull an adult over for not wearing a seat belt, but can ticket them if they are pulled over for another reason and aren't wearing a seat belt. With the new law, the age has been changed to 17 and under. If kids 17 and under are driving without seat belts, the police can pull them over and

ticket them.

• Heard that in November, sales tax receipts collected for the city were \$20,136.56 and for the county were \$15,480.28 for a total of \$35,616.84, mak-Mr. Lawson asked if there were any ing the year-to-date total \$425,301.45, compared to the previous year's total at that time of \$396,926.95.

> • Learned from Mr. Lawson that the new rescue unit for the fire department had arrived and that it was very nice. He said Hays Fire Equipment is interesting in buying the old unit, but the city plans to ask the county first to see if it wants it for the ambulance department. He said the new bucket truck had also arrived and that it, too, was very nice.

> Were presented with two change orders for the water plant. The first was to replace doors at a cost of \$4,419 and the second was for sandblasting and painting the filter beds at a cost of \$43,429, plus a (Continued on Page 5)
