nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School girls varsity basketball team built up some momentum going into this week's Mid-Continent League Tournament with a solid 64-41 win over Trego Community on Friday night in the NCHS Stull Gymnasium in Norton.

Clicking on all cylinders, the Lady Jays (5-3) scored 22 points in the first quarter compared to 10 for the Lady Golden Eagles. Leading the way was Laura Lee Baird with two shots from long range and five free throws.

Norton cooled off in the second quarter when the Lady Jays scored just 8 points and Trego hit 13 to cut the Norton lead to 30-23 at intermission.

Hayli Bozarth hit three baskets to lead scoring as Norton tallied 13 points in the third quarter while allowing Trego only 9 to extend their advantage to 43-32.

With Amanda Ray leading the way with three baskets, Norton built up the final margin of victory to 23 points by outscoring the Lady Golden Eagles 21-9 in the fourth stanza. Norton's aggressive defense limited Trego to just one field goal in the final period.

Northern Valley Ladies win league tournament

The Northern Valley Husky basketball ladies won the championship of the Cheyenne Conference Basketball Tournament with a razor-thin 41-40 win over a veteran Palco team.

The Roosters came into the tourney as the team to beat, having but one loss on their record. Never mind that the Roosters had a senior-dominated roster that included five starters from last year's successful season.

"The bigger they are, the harder they fall," goes an old saw — "if they fall." When Palco met up with the Huskies, in the end they fell.

The victory allowed the Huskies' Coach Chuck Zimmerman to offer a potluck of commentary, such as:

"Our third game of the tournament was for the championship against league favorite Palco, who came into the contest with only one loss on the year. A huge favorite. Palco has a senior-dominated team and one with all five starters back from a successful season last year."

Zimmerman said his team was again up against a taller team, "this time one that was taller than us at each position, so rebounding was going to be a huge determining factor in this the most important game of the season to date.'

"Also for us," the coach said, 'was taking care of the ball as we have not done as well as we need to in this area up to now. We would have to be very protective of the ball when we have it on our possession so we may have as many shot opportunities as possible during the game."

The championship showdown started off very close as both teams scored evenly for the first quarter with the Huskies taking a small lead, a lead nevertheless, 11-9.

In the second period, the Huskies extended the lead by working their pressure defense and collecting numerous rebounds, allowing the Roosters only one offensive board.

The third period allowed Palco's

"These, plus the rest of the team's contributions, gave us a 44-38 rebounding edge which was very key and most importantly the Roosters only had 8 offensive

# ays upset bid falls short

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team played well enough to upset unbeaten Trego Community in Mid-Continent League play Friday night in Norton but fell short at the free throw line and lost 52-49.

It was a tight game throughout with Trego leading 15-13 after one quarter, Norton taking a 28-24 half-time lead and holding onto a 42-36 advantage at the start of the fourth quarter.

The Golden Eagles rallied and outscored the Blue Jays 16-7 in the final stanza to record the win and stay unbeaten at 6-0. The loss dropped Norton to 6-2 for the season.

Trego outscored Norton 7-1 to start the fourth period and tied the score at 43-all with 4:38 remaining. Ryan Pfannenstiel put Trego ahead with two free throws at the 3:34 mark but Preston Herman hit a crucial basket for Norton to tie it at 45-all with 3:09 showing on the scoreboard clock.

A free throw by Nolan Smith put the Golden Eagles on top by one but Norton senior guard Logan Kats drove the lane and scored to put the Blue Jays back ahead 47-46 with 2:08 remaining.

Smith responded at the other end of the court by burying a threepoint shot that put Trego on top 49-47. Norton's Terrell Lane was fouled with 1:43 left and, with ice water in his veins, calmly swished both free throws to knot the score at 49-all.

The final three points belonged to Trego as three Golden Eagles each hit 1 of 2 tries from the charity stripe and Norton, despite several shots at the basket, was not able to find the range.

'We shouldn't have lost this game," said Norton head boys

As a team, Norton connected on 5 of 10 from beyond the arc for 50 percent, 12 of 28 two-point attempts for 43 percent and 17 of 38 overall for 45 percent accuracy.

The Golden Eagles swished 3 of 9 from long range for 33 percent, 11 of 28 two-point tries for 39 percent and 14 of 37 overall for 38 percent.

Norton hit 10 of 22 free throw tries for 45 percent compared to Trego's 21 of 33 for 64 percent.

The rebounding battle was pretty even. Norton grabbed 12 offensive and 15 defensive boards for 27 total and Trego pulled down 12 offensive and 17 defensive caroms for 29 total.
