Physical Education class gets a new character twist

Physical Education classes at Eisenhower Elementary School are enjoying a "Character Building" parachute.

The parachute has 18 panels, each depicting a character building vocabulary word — words like respect, commitment, honesty, trust, loyalty, courage and sportsmanship. Before activities with the parachute begin, one of the words and its definition is discussed and reviewed with the class.

Norton schools back revitalization plan

The Norton School Board chose to sup-

port the Norton County Neighborhood Revitalization Plan at its last meeting.

Economic Development Director Diane Becker said the neighborhood revitalization plan is meant to stimulate economic growth in the county by giving homeowners an incentive to remodel or build new property.

She said the plan would give people who increase their residential property value by at least \$10,000 a tax abatement. The maximum on residential property improvements is \$50,000.

Ms. Becker said those who qualify for the plan would still pay their property taxes, but would get a refund on the new

assessed taxes for the improvements in property taxes would be made up by over a 10-year period. The first year they would receive 100 percent back for the increased property taxes, then 90 percent the following year, then 80 percent and

She said the Norton County Commission has adopted the plan, which includes the entire county, but each taxing entity in the county who wants to participate has to approve the plan.

would total \$5,327 in taxes. The Norton School District's portion of that would be \$1,290.

Superintendent Greg Mann said the plan would have no impact on the district's budget. What the district didn't get

state aid. He said after the first 10 years is up, if there has been a lot of building, the district's state aid would go down. But, they would have more property taxes.

"I don't see much of a downside," he said. "It's not going to cost the school district money and any new construction in the district will help us in the long run."

The board adopted Resolution 2008-05, approving the district's participation If every homeowner in the county in the neighborhood revitalization plan qualified for the maximum rebate, it with a 6-1 vote. Board members Craig Renner, Mark Keilig, Chris Harting, Jennifer Terrell, Scott Ellis and Jeff Nielsen voted yes and Board member Elaine Lofgreen voted no.

Arctic chill brings temperatures in single digits

Brad Mickelson, meteorologist with the National Weather Service Forecast office in Goodland, said there is no measurable accumulation expected in the next few days for northwest Kansas. He said, "There might be a trace of snow or some very light flurries."

Of the recent snowstorm, Mr. Mickelson said most of western Kansas received about what was expected — from a trace to two inches. He said, "Some bands in the area received two inches of snow. But, the blowing winds made it difficult to measure with any degree of certainty."

He said so far this season, the weather service in Goodland has received 19.3 inches of snow. He said that is close to

being on par with last year when the service received 43 inches during the entire season.

Temperatures, though, are going to take a dip as a cold Arctic outbreak sweeps through western Kansas. Mr. Mickelson said temperatures until recently have been average. This Arctic front, however, will keep daytime highs in the single digits this week and into next week.

Coyote, crow calling contest will be Feb. 9

It's time to start boning up on your wildlife calls as the annual covote and crow calling contest is just around the corner.

The contest will be held on Saturday, Feb. 9.

All contestants must be pre-registered by 6 p.m. Friday, Feb. 8.

The contest will begin one-half hour before sunrise and end at sunset. Callers can use any legal means to call and shoot coyotes and crows.

Coyotes and bobcats count for ten points, while crows are one point. The team with the most points will be the winner. In case of a tie, the earliest team to check in will be the winner.

A trophy will be awarded to the top team with a 70 percent payback to the top five teams. There will be an award for the largest coyote and an award for the most crows. The remainder of the proceeds wll be donated to youth shooting sports.

Check in time on Saturday will be from 5:30 to 7 p.m. at O'Briens rear parking lot, 110 S. State St., Norton. No one will be allowed to check in

after 7 p.m. Price of entry is \$30 per two-man team and includes a meal Saturday

Each contestant's name will be put in a drawing for a .243 rifle; contes-

tants must be present to win.

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
