Jays rattle Railroaders

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team took awhile to get warmed up from the bitter cold outside but, once they did, the Blue Jays pulled away to a 62-36 victory over Ellis in the opening round of the Mid-Continent League Tournament in the NCHS Stull Gymnasium on Tuesday evening in Norton.

The No.3 seeded Norton quintet trailed the No.6 Railroaders 10-4 with three minutes left in the first quarter but scored the next six points to tie the score at 10-all at the end of the period.

With senior forward Wes Georgeson leading the way with two baskets, Norton took a 17-10 advantage before the Railroaders scored again with just 2:58 left in the half. Norton outscored Ellis 5-2 to end the half and take a 22-14 lead at intermission.

In the third quarter, the Blue Jays hit seven baskets, including a trey from Landon Hamel, while limiting the Railroaders to just one basket and six free throws as they outscored the visitors 15-8 to go on top 37-22 with the fourth quarter remaining.

The Railroaders had not heard the last from Georgeson, the Blue Jays' leading scorer, who hadn't shot much the first three quarters and had four baskets. In the final stanza, Georgeson couldn't miss. Every shot he took went in as he swished six baskets and a free throw for 13 of Norton's 25 fourth quarter points.

Meanwhile, the shell-shocked Railroaders scored 14 points to for 17 percent, 11 of 35 two-point 67-52 and No.2 Trego defeated hold the final margin of victory to 26 points.

Georgeson missed just two game as he connected on 10 of 11 two-point tries for a net smoking 91 percent accuracy, missed his only shot from beyond the arc and hit 1 of 3 free throws for 33 percent to finish with 21 points.

Senior forward Preston Herman scored 10 points on 4 of 8 twopoint attempts for 50 percent and for 27 total. 2 of 3 free throws for 67 percent. He missed his only trey try.

Leading scorer for Ellis was Daniel Gottschalk with 12.

Norton Lady Jays pull upset

Coach Kevin Jilka's No.5 seeded Norton Community High School girls varsity basketball team upset No.4 seed Smith Center 41-31 in the opening round of the annual Mid-Continent League Tournament on Monday evening in Smith Center.

Both teams struggled shooting from the field but the Lady Jays pulled away for the win by hitting more free throws than the Lady Redmen in the fourth quarter.

Norton held a slim 19-25 advantage after three quarters but hit 10 of 13 free throws along with just one basket to outscore the home team 12-6 and extend the final margin of victory to 10

Taylor Rossi hit 5 of 6, Laura Lee Baird and Chantille Campbell each 2 of 2 and Courtney Cox 1 of 3 from the line in the final stanza.

Hayli Bozarth hit her only basket of the game in the period.

All 6 of the Lady Redmen's fourth quarter points came from the charity stripe.

Norton took a 10-5 lead in the first quarter. Smith Center outscored Norton 10-9 in the second stanza but the Lady Jays were still on top 19-15 at intermission.

Both teams tallied 10 points in the third quarter.

"It wasn't a thing of beauty but we got the job done and get to move on to Hays to play in the semi-finals," said coach Jilka.

Norton with 15 points on 2 of 10 from long range for 20 percent, 2 of 5 two-point attempts for 40 percent, 4 of 15 overall for 27 percent and 5 of 6 free throws for 83 percent accuracy.

Campbell was Norton's second double figure scorer. She hit 4 of 7 from close range for 57 percent and was 2 of 3 from the charity stripe for 67 percent and 10 points.

Both teams had a sub-par shooting percentage from the field. Norton hit 3 of 14 three-point tries for 21 percent, 7 of 27 two-point attempts for 26 percent and 10 of 41 overall for just 24 percent.

The Lady Redmen connected on 1 of 4 from beyond the arc for 25 percent, 7 of 30 two-point tries for 23 percent and 8 of 34 overall for just 23 percent accuracy.

The Lady Jays won it from the free throw line where they connected on 18 of 24 for 75 percent compared to Smith Center's 14 of 25 for 56 percent.

The rebounding battle was a standoff. Norton grabbed 7 offensive and 21 defensive rebounds for 28 total and Smith Center pulled down 8 offensive and 19 defensive caroms for 27 total.
