Dorothy Douglass Leidig Dec. 9, 1912 - Jan. 20, 2008

Dorothy Douglass Leidig, 95, formerly of Lenora, died Jan. 20 at Lawrence Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Leidig was born in Kansas City, Mo., on Dec. 9, 1912, the daughter of Thomas L. and Metta Douglass.

She graduated from Southwest High School in Kansas City in 1930 and attended Kansas City Junior College and Horner Institute, before entering Kansas University as a junior. At KU, she completed a bachelor's degree in psychology, although her interests also included music and French.

In 1934, she married Karl Leidig of Lenora where they lived for 39 years before moving to Hays where they lived for 20 years following her husband's retirement from the banking business. Since the death of her husband in 1983, Mrs. Leidig had lived in Lawrence.

Her hobbies included painting, languages and traveling. She visited all the world's major countries, except India. She also enjoyed flying a small private Cessna Skyhawk. She was devoted to classical music, especially the pipe organ and piano.

In the 1950s she supervised five counties of volunteer activity of the American Cancer Society and was active in the Social Action Committee of the Congregational Church. She served on the ex-

ecutive board of the High Plains Mental Health Center in Hays and on the board of the Exchange Bank of Lenora.

She remained interested in her memberships in the following organizations: Plymouth Congregational Church, the American Guild of Organists, PEO Sisterhood, K.U. Alumni Association, Gamma Phi Beta Sorority, Lawrence Music Club, Sigma Alpha Iota (Patroness), Tennola Club, and various local charitable organizations.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Karl, a sister, Winifred Alton, and her devoted companion, William Noud.

She is survived by her daughter, Marilyn and Roy Gridley, Lawrence; a sister, May Fallman, Lexington, Mo.; two grandsons; and her beloved pet, Kitty Lingling.

In accordance with her wishes, there was no funeral or memorial service. Cleaning products could house bacteria

Did you know that what you've been using to clean your kitchen may instead be spreading bacteria? Read on as we take a look at how you can protect your family from germs that can cause sickness.

Cloth hand towels, sponges and dishcloths can be a good place to find bacteria! Why? Food, moisture and moderate temperatures help germs grow quickly. One hundred bacteria on a dishcloth can multiply to 25,600 bacteria in just two hours.

You and your family can stop helping bacteria grow quickly in your kitchen by following these tips:

- Start each day with a clean cloth hand towel and dishcloth.
- Use cloth hand towels only for drying clean hands.

- Instead of a cloth, use a clean single-use paper towel for wiping dirty hands, mouths, faces, the floor, or other objects, and for wiping raw juices from meat and poultry.

- To clean, wash kitchen counters, table or other work spaces with hot soapy water using a dishcloth. Rinse with clear water.

- To kill germs, wipe or spray work spaces with a mixture of a capful (or about a teaspoon) each of chlorine bleach and vinegar in a quart of water.

- Allow clean dishes to air dry. Do not dry them with towels.

- Launder kitchen towels and dishcloths in hot soapy water. Add a little chlorine bleach and vinegar to the wash cycle.

Do not use synthetic or loofah sponges in the kitchen. Why not? First, even water in the dishwasher does not get hot enough to kill the germs in the inside of a sponge. Second, after recent reports that the best way to sterilize a kitchen sponge was to heat it in a microwave oven, some people were surprised to find their sponge caught on fire!

If you like to use a sponge in the kitchen, use a cellulose sponge with no metal parts. To kill 99% of bacteria on the sponge, rinse it to remove detergent and other chemicals, soak it fully with water, and place it in a microwave oven. Heat for two minutes at 1,000 watts. Remove hot sponge carefully. Repeat daily. Replace the sponge every week or so.
