

Regulations meeting canceled

The Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) meeting about interstate transportation regulations, scheduled for Monday, Feb. 11 in Norton, has been canceled until further notice. The KCC notified the Norton County Treasurer's office on Thursday that, because of legislation, they have decided to cancel all of the informational meetings planned dealing with federal regulations being enforced with farm trucks hauling grain to the elevators and shipped out of state; commercial driver's licenses; driver qualifications; safety requirements; U.S. Department of Transportation numbers and markings, weights and scales; barter exchange; farm use tags and more. The other meetings in the Northwest Kansas area have also been cancelled.

Saturday will see 64 GOP presidential caucuses held in 61 counties.

If you are a registered Republican you may vote at any one caucus in your Congressional District, but it does not have to be in the county where you live. Each Congressional District must have at least one caucus, but there is no maximum number of caucuses that can be held.
