Mrs. Burd combed Nataley's long, dark hair and asked if she was ready.

### Rexford offers motorists place of safety

will have a place to go for safety. Rexford City Council and the Rexford Community Church are working out the details of making the church the town's emergency

"We gave an informal OK a few months ago," said Lane Purcell, preacher at the church located at 205 Main.

shelter.

Purcell said the city will help with utilities at the church when it is used for emergency purposes. Plans are to install an electric generator in the church to be used when Rexford's electricity is out. Plans are also to have sleeping cots and other necessities on hand should people have to stay a substantial amount of time.

Purcell is hoping church mem-

bers and other Rexford residents will provide meals for those who stay long-term.

Purcell said part of the reason for having the church prepared as an emergency shelter stemmed from what happened last winter. On Dec. 30, 2006, a blizzard crippled Northwest Kansas from closed roads to power outages. Purcell remembers those days well.

"There were people stranded on Highway 83 and there were people in their 70s, 80s and 90s that didn't have electricity," he said.

U.S. Highway 83 is a popular north-south route in western Kansas. The highway goes through Rexford.

Purcell said several older residents who live outside of Rexford were without power during, and after, the storm. Should the church quickly

fill up during that time, there is

"In the 26 months I've been here, that's happened twice," said Ron Boller, outreach director.

Boller said the storm the weekend after Thanksigiving in 2005 forced travelers to stop at Rexford. Last winter, the Lamar, Colo.,

Community College basketball team was returning from a game in McCook, Neb., and was stopped in Rexford because of inclement weather. The team stayed at Shepherd's Staff until it was clear to leave.

"We had about 40 people that night," Boller said.


