(Continued from Page 1) know what the commission's plans were for the ambulance building and if it would be for sale after a new facility was built. Mr. Miller said he knew it was a direct questions, but that the hospital might be interested in putting the nursing school there if it was for sale. The commission said they didn't know if they wanted to sell the building, since the county needs storage space as well as a secure area to put election equipment.

In other business, the commission met with:

• Curt Archibald, solid waste supervisor, who said one of the requirements for participation in the E-Waste program with Osborne County is scale certification. The county's scales, he said, are now certified, but small items being weighed won't register on the scales. Another requirement, he said, is that customers must remove all data from the computers delivered to the waste site. Mr. Archibald and the commission discussed how this will be done and what the process would be if hard drives still have data on them.

Mr. Archibald said Norton city crews delivered the demolition debris from a home in Norton last week. He said the debris totaled 26.41 tons, which is higher than was absolutely necessary because it wasn't sorted. Mr. Archibald said he will speak to City Administrator

• Discussed a request from BEB and Associates to do survey work for the county. Brian and Edward Berlier, owners of the relatively new company, asked that the county consider them when survey work was needed. The commission agreed to work with the Berliers and let Mr. Brannan know they are available locally.

"Snowfall in Kansas can vary quite a bit, not only from location to location, but year to year," said State of Kansas climatologist Mary Knapp. "The average annual snowfall in Kansas is 19 inches. It ranges from 11 inches a year in Parsons to over 40 inches a year in Goodland."

Knapp, who runs the Kansas Weather Data Library based in Kansas State University Research and Extension, said the greatest 24-hour snowfall recorded in Kansas was on Oct. 26, 1997 when Norcatur received 24 inches. St.

With winter still stretching Goodland has had years of little snowfall, Knapp said. During 1998, 1999, 2000 and

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
