Development makes offer on building

Development Board is making an offer on the LuJon's building in downtown Norton.

The board looked at the building Tuesday before its monthly meeting and met with the building's owner, Mark Wilcox. Mr. Wilcox originally wanted \$65,000 for the building and then went down to \$50,000.

The board is making an offer of \$42,000 and, if the offer is accepted, will pay for it out of its capital outlay fund.

If economic development buys the building, it will be used as business incubator space, said Director Diane Becker. The first floor will be used as a place to house new retail businesses, while the second floor could be used for county storage. She said if they get the building, they will be looking into grants to remodel the second floor.

If the offer is accepted, this will be economic development's first capital outlay project.

Economic development is also

working on finding space for a new industrial park on U.S. 36.

In other business, the board: • Declined to give the Entrepreneurship Center in Phillipsburg a monetary donation, but will instead advertise the center's classes through the economic development office and offer scholarships to Norton County residents who would like to attend

 Approved a scholarship application for economic development related classes.

• Will offer the county \$2,850 to offset the cost of the Neighborhood Revitalization Plan and its training.

• Heard Ms. Becker will be putting a proposal together for the Moffet gas station on State Street, which will be presented at the public hearing for demolition at 5:45 p.m. on Wednesday, March 5 at the Norton city building.

 Created a Promoting Norton committee. The committee will have two representatives from Economic Development — board members Deena Wente and Curtis Eveleigh — two representatives

from the Norton Area Chamber of Commerce and two representatives from Travel and Tourism. The committee members will be working together to promote Norton and the county.

• Changed the spring internship. It is now a non-paying position and the intern will research business incubator management, rather than building a website for economic development.

• Teamed up with Northwest Kansas Technical College to offer basic computer courses.

• Learned that Natoma Corporation received OSHA's SHARP designation for meeting the highest standards for health and safety in the workplace. Gov. Kathleen Sebelius signed a proclamation making the designation.

• Heard the Norton Area Chamber of Commerce's annual banquet will be held on March 10 at the Eagles Club. Social hour will begin at 6 p.m. and dinner will begin at 7 p.m. The speaker will be John Allen, the former chief operating officer of the Cincinnati Reds, who was born in Norton.

Crop disaster program deadline is March 15

Farmers are reminded that March crop, form CCC-576, Notice of deadlines; must maintain produc-15 is the application closing date for Loss, must be filed with the gov- tion evidence for three years; not certain crops under the Noninsured ernment agency within 15 calenexceed \$2 million gross revenue Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) with the Farm Service Agency (FSA). Crops eligible for NAP benefits are limited to those not insurable in the county and which are produced for food or fiber.

March 15 is the final date to pay the applicable service fee and obtain NAP coverage for sorghum forage, coarse grains, vegetable and melon crops, Amaranth, chestnuts, cotton, pecans, pumpkins, safflower, sesame, squash and walnuts. The administrative service fee is \$100 per crop per administrative county, not to exceed \$300 per producer per administrative county and a \$900 maximum fee for multi-county producers. If you are interested, you must pay the fee and file form CCC-471, Application for Coverage by the deadline.

This coverage entitles eligible farmers to a payment of 55 percent of an average market price for the commodity if a natural disaster caused a 50 percent, or greater, production loss of an eligible crop.
