Other topics Rep. Moran spoke about at the request of the audience were:

• Kansas Highways — He said a bill was introduced that would raise the gas tax by 45 cents over the next five years to help pay for highways. However, he said he doesn't know a politician in Washington that would vote for that kind of increase. Right now, he said 18 cents a gallon goes to the highway fund, but it is no longer enough to pay for highways. Most highway dollars go to state programs, meaning that although the federal government gives states a lot of money, the state itself deter- from," he said. • Drivers' License Age — He said determining the age limit on drivers' licenses is a state issue. more.' He does know that a bill to raise the age someone can get a license has been brought before the state legislature. Raising the age, he said, mostly has to do with safety. However, the people who protest the most are parents who don't have time to take their teenagers everywhere they need to go.

• Rail Industry — He said they need to focus on the rail industry to take some of the stress off highways. He's heard that there need to be more cars to ship grain. Also, he said they don't want to lose the passenger lines. He said more needs to be put in the railways so that in remote places, where the population isn't as high, the lines aren't lost.

• 2008 Election — Rep. Moran said he doesn't like to say it, but nothing seems to really get done in an election year.

"The goal in Washington ought accomplished. Instead, I have to tell you what my goals are, what I want to work on.'

He said Congress is not in line with most people and the politicians in Congress think they have to create a problem to get people angry so that they will vote.

"We need voters who are informed and politicians who know what is going on where they're

As for the presidential election, he said he was a kid who grew up liking politics, but even he is already tired of the presidential election.

"The watch word in 2008 is change," he said. "Americans are fed up with the way things are. So politicians are saying the word change, but aren't saying what it is they plan to change."

• Iraq War — He said the nation can't afford to be there 100 years from now. The military, he said, has done everything that has been expected of them. The civilian leaders are where the problem is. To win this war, the entire nation has to be mobilized. Instead, the soldiers and their families are bearing the brunt, while everyone else goes on with their normal life.

We need leaders who will tell us the whole story," he said. "I don't think we could have fought World War II with the nightly news." • National Borders – Rep.

Moran said he has voted to put military on the borders. It's not the perfect solution, he said, but something needs to be done.

"Our borders matter," he said. "If you can just come across the border, then you don't have to follow our rules."

But, he said, the country has an immigration system that doesn't work. He said he is not surprised that people are coming across illegally. It takes years to get a legal visa. He said they need to have a system that checks health and then checks the security of people wanting to come into the country. He said it should take months, not years.

"Our borders are more about national security and crime than anything else," he said. "They're about the potential tremendous loss of life if a terrorist comes through. That's why the military is needed. The borders shouldn't have become the political football that they have."

• Interstate Regulation for Farm Trucks — He said the Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) has been wanting to treat farmers who take their grain by truck from their farm to the local elevator as if they were transporting across state borders. The KCC is under the impression that it will lose federal funding if it doesn't. Rep. Moran said he has been working with state officials to convince the KCC to back off this issue. He said there are only two other states having this problem right now and if it were a federal edict, all 50 states would be crying about it.
