Wayne Edward Bernard Sept. 26, 1915 - March 19, 2008

Wayne Edward Bernard, died March 19, 2008 at Logan Manor in Logan, Kansas at the age of 92 years, 5 months and 22 days.

He was born September 26, 1915, near Alma to Edward and Elizabeth (Rafferty) Bernard. When he was about 4, the family moved to Densmore and farmed the Sauerwein place. There, he attended grade school and graduated from Densmore Rural High School in 1933, playing all 4 years on the football team.

He enlisted in the US Navy on 23 October, 1942 in Kansas City, served most of his time at an aircraft salvage facility in Hawaii, and was discharged on 02, January 1946, at Camp Shoemaker, California.

He enjoyed watching sports and keeping up on the statistics, reading Westerns, especially Zane Grey and Louis L'Amour; and doing crossword puzzles.

A long-time resident of Denver, Colorado, he worked for many years at Swift and Co. Packing House, and as a custodian at Jefferson County School. On Feb. 12, 1999, he

moved into Logan Manor where he remained until his death.

He was predeceased by his parents; his sister, Alice Riemann; brothers, Ray and Homer; brother-in-law, Alf Riemann; and nephew, Harold Riemann.

Survivors are a sister-in-law, Dorothy Bernard, Norton and nieces and nephews, including Rita Riemann Hockman, Densmore; Duane Riemann, Phillipsburg; Bernard Riemann, Mesquite, Nev.; Ruth Riemann Roe, Osage City; Karen Riemann Walters, Albion, NE.; Mary Ellen Riemann Posson, Norton; Ardie Bernard Grimes, Baldwin City; Beth Bernard Metcalf, Liberal; and Ed Bernard, Wellington.

There will be no services at his request. Private family burial of cremains will take place at a later date in the Bernard family plot in Calvary Cemetery, Densmore.

Club learns about heart disease and symptoms of a stroke

Fifteen members of the Mid-Century Greater Federation of Womens Clubs met March 27 at the home of Lynn Nelson with Norma Rumford as co-hostess. The theme for the evening was "Trunk for a Healthy Lifestyle". Doris Winteroth presented the lesson, "Women's Health Today - Heart, Stroke". She told the group that while they often think of heart attacks and strokes to be mostly for men and "older people", the truth is that heart disease is the No. 1 killer of American women. No matter their race or ethnic background, one of every three women dies of heart disease. By contrast, one in every 30 deaths in women is from breast cancer. Women still need to be concerned about breast cancer, but heart disease casts a bigger shadow over your life and it is important to take action now.

A stroke is caused when blood flow to the brain is obstructed by a clot or break in a blood vessel. Strokes are the third leading cause of death. More women suffer strokes than men. If you think someone is having a stroke, there are three easy steps to take. Remember S.T.R.

S — ask the individual to smile (check to see if both sides of the face look the same)

T — ask the individual to talk, or speak a simple sentence

R — ask the individual to raise both arms

If you think you or someone else

is having a heart attack or a stroke, call 911 immediately. Ask for an ambulance. Do not try to get to the hospital on your own.

Distribution will be at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, April 26 at the Norton Senior Center.

The April Food Pak may be purchased for \$21.50 and two hours of volunteer service. The package contains 1 pound of lean country brats, 1 pound of pulled beef in barbecue sauce, 1 pound of fully cooked flame broiled beef steak, 2 pounds of split chicken breasts, 1 pound of Asian style turkey strips, plus 6 to 8 different fruits and vegetables.

After purchasing a Prairie Pack, an additional meat only package may be purchased for \$12 plus one more hour of service.

A fruit and veggie pack may be purchased for \$10 plus one additional hour of service.

There are three April Specials. Special No. 1 is a Spring Burger Blowout. For \$13 and one additional hour of service you will receive a 5 pound box of 15 individually wrapped 1/3 pound sirloin steak burgers.

Special No. 2 is 24, 3 ounce Oreo Pie slices, individually wrapped and boxed. This special is \$15 plus one additional hour of service.

The Hen House Special is the third choice. For \$17 and one more of of volunteer work you will receive 2 pounds of breaded chicken breast filets, 2 pounds of boneless chicken wings, 2 pounds of unbreaded chicken breast filets and 2 pounds of lightly breaded chicken breast tenders.

Volunteer work is anything you do out of the kindness of your heart, that you don't get paid for. Anytime you make someone's day a little brighter will qualify you for the Prairie Land Food Program.
