Mayor David Corns polled the Norton City Council at one of their recent sessions about their goals for the city over the next year.

 $\sqrt{\text{Elaine}}$ Mann said safety is one of her first priorities, and finishing the water plant project is also important.

 $\sqrt{\text{Ron Briery would like to see the re-}}$ strooms in Elmwood Park completed in the next year, and move forward with the demolition of dilapidated properties. He also hopes to complete the phase I project and start Phase II at the water plant in the near future. Additionally, he agreed the streets need to be improved, and said he would like to attract new people and new businesses to Norton for the betterment of the community.

 \sqrt{J} eff Otter would like to see new businesses in the community, and likes what economic development has been doing. He saw a need to attract more businesses downtown to keep younger people here.

√Donna Foley sees healthy drinking water as a priority so the city can stop sending out the violation letters. She also mentioned curbs and gutters need to be fixed, and she wants to continue with demolishing the substandard structures in the city. She also wants the city to continue its support of economic development, and also wants to see the water tower painted this year.

Tornado activity sparks question

Are there more tornadoes now than in past years in the nation?

That was the question put before David Floyd, Warning Coordination Meteorologist, at the National Weather Service, Goodland.

He hesitated for a moment or two, then indicated in his answer, he didn't think so.

The Telegram wondered because seemingly each morning when we turn on the television, there are more pictures of more tornado destruction and unfortunately deaths. It gives the impression the activity is on the rise.

Mr. Floyd indicated that violent tornadoes, nationally, have remained on what he called a *flat curve* the last 55-60 years (little or no increase), while lower level tornadoes have shown an increase.

Mr. Floyd reasoned that with much improved technology, more trained spotters, cell phones and phones with picture capability, we are being made aware of these storms and their aftermath much sooner than in the past.

He said when you go back 50-60 years, there wasn't a whole lot to go on. He said it wasn't until some years down the road that a more detailed approach to tornado reporting and record keeping surfaced.

When asked if the eight-county area

of northwest Kansas - Cheyenne to Norton, south to Graham and west to Sherman — had any tornado touchdowns this early in the 2008 tornado season, he said there have not been any confirmed reports. There have been some strong thunderstorms with winds of from 60 to 80 miles per hour, however, causing damage and accompanied by large hail.

In May of 2007, 77 tornadoes were reported in Kansas with 22 touching down in the eight-county area. Sherman had seven, Cheyenne four, Rawlins three, Thomas, Sheridan and Graham two each, and Decatur and Norton one apiece, according to the National Weather Service.

Last year was a very active year for tornado activity in Kansas. All total, there were 137 of those things, 80 above the 1950-2007 average of 57. Those storms claimed 14 lives and injured 82.

Interestingly, the 2007 total of 137 tornadoes set a new record, surpassing the 135 set just two years prior.

Since the year 2000, 834 tornadoes occurred in Kansas, which is greater than any decade since 1950.

The 137 tornadoes in 2007 in Kansas, were the result of one EF5, one violent, ten strong and 125 weak tornadoes.
