# Two new faces on council, appointments approved

She sought permission to use the area in Elmwood Park west of the horse arena. She said this would he a fund raiser for the club. The council approved the request, thus the Culpepper and Merriweather Circus will be in Norton to perform on June 3 at 5 and 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Corns told the council that Toby Kuhn has resigned his position on the Housing Authority Board, due to his election to the city council. He sought council approval to name Kyle Jones to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Kuhn which expires Nov. 30, 2008.

Chamber of Commerce Coun- reported interviews were held for the Utility Plant Supervisor's position, and Bill Vacura has been hired for the post. He was scheduled to begin employment May 5 and train with Dick Hahn until his retirement.

Mr. Lawson also said he will meet with two people to get quotes to install sheet rock and finish the community room at the library. He said if neither one submits a bid the city can afford, city personnel will finish the walls, paint them and install new ceiling tiles. His hopes are to meet the May 13 deadline for the project.

A request for 215 feet of sidewalk replacement at 322 N. Norton Street by Jeff Wolf was approved, with the stipulation the city will provide the labor and the property owner pay the cost of the materials directly to the concrete

A Safe Ride Program was discussed. The council moved to use \$100 per year of the Elmwood Park head tax funds for the program. A discussion centered around whether someone needs to be 21 to use the program. City Attorney Griffiths said she wants a licensed taxi service to provide the service who would be licensed through the city and carry liability coverage. She will prepare an ordinance for the Public Safety Committee to review.

The council adopted Ordinance 1573, designating a stop intersection at E. Waverly and N. Archer, stopping southbound traffic on N.
