What kind of stories do your bulletins tell?

The response to my little gas tax poll didn't bring about the response I had hoped. If you recall, in the May 6 Telegram, I asked readers how they felt about the proposal by two presidential candidates to eliminate the 18.4-cent federal gas tax per gallon at the pump from Memorial Day to Labor Day. I received 11 responses with 6 voting yes and 5 voting no.

Wednesday evening I pulled up to the pump at Love's after 6 p.m., so I had to prepay inside. I told the clerk I would be pumping in 30 gallons. At the stated price outside, which was \$3.69, and if the plan to eliminate the federal gas tax was in play, I would have saved roughly \$1.45 (according to the new math of a few years ago). Not enough to buy one of their subs.

If gas stayed at \$3.69 during the 12 weeks of the plan to eliminate the federal gas tax and I put in 30 gallons each of those weeks, I would have pumped \$360 worth of gas into my vehicle and saved only \$17. That doesn't sound like much of a bargain to me — spending \$360 on something to realize a \$17 savings.

I also felt the companies that supply the gas would probably, during that 12 week period, hike the gas prices to compensate for the loss. So I guess if I had voted in my own poll, it would be tied at 6-6.

Just another campaign gimmick. What's the old saw, "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.'

Please don't take your frustrations out on the good people who work at the places that sell gasoline. Remember, they too, pay what you pay for gas.

I see where Sen. Edwards endorsed Sen. Obama Wednesday. I don't know what kind of impact that is going to have, if any. But if memory serves me correctly, Sen. Edwards never won any of the primaries he was involved in while contesting Clinton and Obama. And I don't think, as some of the pundits are now saying, that Obama will pick him as his vice presidential candidate if Obama gets his party's nod. Edwards was Sen. John Kerry's running mate and we all know how that ended up. I think the endorsement will land Edwards a cabinet post.



Please keep an eye on this disorder

bout a year ago a dear friend called me to tell me they had just returned home from Arizona where her daughter had been in treatment. The lovely 17 year old was not in treatment for alcohol or drugs, nor cancer or diabetes, she was in treatment for an eating disorder. I must admit my knowledge of eating disorders was very limited. I had heard the words anorexia and bulimia, but words such as binge and purge were foreign to me and so began my search.

The National Institute of Mental Health said C. Everett Koop, former Surgeon General of the United States, found, "The mortality rate from eating disorders is twelve times higher than the annual death rate due to all causes of death among females ages 15-24 and is responsible for over 300,000 preventable deaths each year."

Many will say this is a new disorder, but it isn't, it dates back to the 1600's at least. It is easily hidden because there is no dealer or contact, it is a solitary threat within the victim. Parents are frequently the last to know because sometimes the girls do not look extremely thin or sickly as we anticipate, but the tragedy of this is the damage that is slowly destroying Phase II Mary Kay Woodyard



these young girls. Damage to the heart, lungs goes on for some time undetected until it is irreversible and the threat of death is imminent.

For those of us brought up on the idea, food will make us feel better it is hard to grasp the destruction of this silent killer. For these young girls the food doesn't make them feel better. The food is not the problem; it is only a symptom of the problem. Underlying issues must be addressed before they are free to move on with their life and work toward healing. The average eating disorder patient will endure the battle for 15 years. Years in the heart of their development, both physically but socially and emotionally as well.

young girls develop a healthy image of their body. Did you know if Barbie was a real person, she would be 7 feet tall and

weigh 110 pounds? And this is the toy of choice for young girls from extremely young ages. Another issue in our society is the lack of a cohesive dinner hour. Studies suggest young girls who sit with families during dinner hour are less likely to develop an eating disorder.

There is no one cause of eating disorders, everything from faulty genes to a bipolar disorder are suspects in this terrible disease and several things in combination may be significant to its development. One thing is critical and that is to seek help sooner rather than later. Treatment can save lives.

My friend's daughter is fighting and she knows it is the fight of her life. She learned much, as did her family, from two months in treatment, but the battle continues. In the year since returning home she has been hospitalized three times.

She gets up each morning knowing she must spiritually walk hand in hand with her God to win this war. One of the most important things that will help in this battle is awareness, the more we Society, unfortunately, doesn't help learn the better armed we are to help our young girls gain power over this invisible, silent killer.
