Simple lines add to appeal of glass pattern

One of the most graceful of all the Early American Pattern Glass designs is the classic Galloway pattern. It is not one of the oldest, having first appeared around 1904-06, nor is it one of the more expensive lines, but it is one that has a lot of appeal because of its simplicity.

Developed and marketed by the well-known U.S. Glass Company of Pittsburg, Pa., originally as their Pattern No. 15086, the Galloway design was later sold to the Jefferson Glass Company of Toronto, Canada. As was the case with many of the pattern glasses, it went through several name changes over the years. Early Butler Brothers glass catalogs showed it as Mirror and later as Mirror Plate. For a brief period of time one catalog listed it as Woodrow. It was also marketed as Virginia but that name was dropped when another pattern was chosen to represent the state of Virginia in the famous U.S. Glass series of patterns named for various states.

The basic Galloway features long, vertical panels ornamented at the base by a scalloped band of cut diamonds. The panels appear as elongated ovals set horizontally on round bowls and are flared into petals on compotes and curvy pieces. The original production was only in clear glass and rose blush. Rose blushed pieces book at more than double the price of clear, so keep your eyes peeled for pink. A small production came out with ruby flash panels designed for the souvenir cups often sold etched with names, dates, and such. If you should run across one of them, you are a fortunate collector, indeed.

One peculiarity of Galloway may throw the beginning collector for a loop. The pattern was made for hotel table use in a slightly pudgier design. A regular Galloway water pitcher will be tall and straight and should hold two quarts where the "squatier" hotel version will hold less than a quart. There were also miniature sets that are a nice addition to a collection. Availability is not an issue for the Galloway collector. Their table set included a multitude of pieces and a wide variety of sizes as well Happy Hunting!

as some items not usually found in table sets. Among the more unusual pieces are egg cups, a great cracker jar with a Britannia metal lid, mugs, several shapes of vases, and a bride's basket created by the addition of a handle to the largest celery vase. Watch out for the toothpick holder, however. It has been reproduced for years and years in every color imaginable by the Summit Art Glass Company.

The States Series put out by U.S.

Glass appropriated and changed a lot of pattern names, creating confusion to puzzle collectors. Names chosen to market different patterns have always fascinated me. Some are descriptive of the theme motif, especially in the fruit and flower patterns but others appear to have no rhyme or reason at all. Many carry names of people such as Hamilton, Ida, Pavona or Skilton. Galloway is a common family name in Trego and Graham County, Kan., but I doubt they were the source of the pattern glass name. Particular favorites of mine are the old original Westward Ho, Cord Drapery, Bethlehem Star and almost all the swirl designs. Diamonds, circles, ovals and thumbprints abound in patterns and often figure in the names. With over 4,000 named at World Fairs where they were patterns there has to be one to suit every taste.

> Prices for vintage glassware can change rapidly due to that old law of supply and demand but right at the moment most pieces of Galloway can be easily found between \$50 and \$75. The cruet, the water set tray and water jugs are usually over \$100 with the cracker jar (original lid) at \$200 plus. I am not seeing much good old glass appearing at auctions these day and it is getting a little thin on the ground even in shops. So if you're a collector that likes the looking almost as much as the finding, perhaps Early American Pattern Glass is the field for you.
