The 40 large-format color photographs and text reveal the many ways the plants and animals in a rainforest compete with but also depend on each other: the contrasts between solitary cats and intricately organized armies of ants; the different ways plants struggle for a place in the sun, and the ways these plants attract animals to pollinate their flowers. Herbs are great way to add flavor and zest

Cooking with fresh herbs is "in" again since The Food Channel has featured it in recent years, yet it is as old as the hills. Our great grandmothers "yarb" patch served as their medicine cabinet as well as their stock of spices. Salt was expensive and sometimes hard to come by, so ity. HERBED CRACKERS

One cup flour

Half a teaspoon salt

Quarter teaspoon freshly ground peppercorns

Two tablespoon freshly chopped chives

One tablespoon fresh Thyme, coarsely chopped One tablespoon fresh Oregano, coarsely chopped

Four tablespoons real butter, cut up in small chunks

Quarter of a cup of sour cream

Kosher salt (for sprinkling) Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Using a food processor, pulse flour, salt, pepper and herbs. Add butter chunks and pulse until mixture resembles corn meal, add sour cream and process until dough comes together. Dump out on floured surface, divide into two parts, roll each into a 10x12 inch rectangle. Sprinkle with Kosher salt and roll gently to embed crystals into dough. Use a pizza cutter to cut each sheet into 2 inch squares or cut with a cookie cutter or crimping wheel for fancier shapes. Let the crackers rest for a minute, transfer to ungreased cookie sheets, prick all over with a fork and bake twelve to fourteen minutes. Crackers should be lightly brown and firm to the touch. Cool on wire rack and store in airtight container. Makes about two dozen

This is a particularly good cracker for those allergic to corn. Almost every commercial cracker contains corn syrup, corn flour or cornstarch. These may also be made with rice flour for those allergic to wheat, and you can even control the salt level to suit your diet. Mrs. Dash may be used in place of Kosher salt if necessary. No matter how many you make, however, they just will not keep, having a tendency to disappear rapidly into mouths.
