Stopping violence led by volunteers

Stop the Violence volunteer at Norton Correctional Facility, Sharon Leiker, spoke to the Norton Lions Club at their June 17 meeting. Also speaking was Sondra Petrie, Unit Team Manager at the facility.

Ms. Petrie said the program is designed to help those inmates who are really serious about changing themselves. Stop the Violence is strictly a voluntary program. An inmate has to attend three consecutive meetings before he is considered a member. She said most Kansas prisons have this volunteer-led program in place. The Norton facility has one class in medium security led by Mary Tubbs, Phillipsburg, and one class in minimum security led by Ms. Leiker. There are 20 members in the medium class and 17 members in the minimum class.

Sue Ellen Freid created the program in 1982. At first it was taught in conjunction with bul-

lying programs introduced into schools. She later decided to bring it to the prison system.

The inmates workbook contains the Optimist Club creed which encourages positive thinking. The workbook was written by an inmate at Lansing Correctional Facility.

The Norton group is committed to helping the local community. The group has already held one fundraiser to benefit God's Pantry. With help from the local Pizza Hut, the group held another fundraiser with proceeds being donated to the main office of Stop the Violence, which operates on grants, additional money to God's Pantry and some money to buy books for the Stop the Violence library at the prison.

Ms. Petrie said the recidivism rate for men completing the Stop the Violence program is 23 percent compared to 70 percent nationwide.
