"It is the same thing over and over again; errors are killing our team," said Norton head coach Joe Durham. "To date, we have made over 50 errors when, last year, we made only 49 errors all season. To be a good team, you can't make errors.

"These kinds of mistakes start with the pitchers getting frustrated and then the other players get frustrated, which causes disunity on the team. We make the ESPN type plays but it is the ordinary plays where you field and catch the ball that are killing our team.

"Last night, I saw some players go all out and sacrifice their bodies while some other players just went through the motion of playing.

'We have not had the same lineup all year due to work schedules, injuries, other commitments and that is another reason for the losses. Once I get the same nine players game after game that will be our starting line-up. We took 11 players to Smith Center and, for the first three to four innings in each game, we played good, until the wheels came off. We lose our focus and that causes errors and we don't have the pitching to recover from too many mistakes. The only way we can get better is

the bottom of the third to make it a commitment to getting better 10-5. Norton's final two runs came so I expect to see better play out of them.

> We suffered some injuries last night that are going to affect our pitching. Jordan Durham took a line shot in the stomach off one of our former players Logan Keiswetter that is not going to let him pitch for awhile. That is going to put more pressure on our other pitchers so developing pitchers is our No.1 priority. Fresno State proved that a team that plays together can win and our players noticed that.

> 'When you have one of the best coaches in the world in Steve Jeltz, someone who loves the game, I see no reason for our team to not improve. The only way we are going to get better is to go back to the basics, building arm strength for our ptichers, our infielders taking ground balls and hitting fly balls to our outfielders.

> "At one time, we had 21 players on this team but injuries and other commitments have whittled our team down. Starting Monday, our team is going to practice three times a week in the morning trying to improve and get better. Hopefully, we can develop more pitching or someone who has pitched will join our team. A coach can always hope.'

> Norton goes to to Minden, Neb. today for a double header, beginning at 6 p.m. On Sunday, they will host Scott City at John Ryan Field.Games will be played at 3 p.m. and 5 p.m.
