Because the old tea house behind the service station, including anything within 500 feet of it, is protected by Kansas Historical Preservation Law, there were a lot of legal hoops to jump through to get approval for demolition.

On March 5, 2008, Miss Becker went before the city council to propose the building be used as a visitor's center. The city agreed, and gave her 180 days to demolish the cafe side and have the exterior painted. With the exception of some detail

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
