Wind energy talks on agenda

Logan County Economic Development Director Dan Hartman and Norton County Economic Development Director Diane Becker invited the Norton County Commissioners on Monday to a meeting about wind energy.

Mr. Hartman is interested in getting 12 Northwest Kansas counties together to see if they can form a collaboration and all work together to bring wind energy turbines to this area of the state. Mr. Hartman said Sen. Sam Brownback might be there as well.

front of it, instead of chasing behind it," Mr. Hartman said. "We live in the Saudi Arabia of wind energy," he said.

Mr. Hartman agreed with the council that there are many, many issues large and small — that would need to be worked out before even putting in an order for a wind turbine; however, he is very supportive of wind farms in Northwest Kansas. "In the last 50 years, nothing has come down the pike that would put cash directly into the family farmers' hands like this will," he said.

The meeting will be held at the Colonial Steakhouse Restaurant outside of Oakley, Wednesday, Aug. 13 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

All the equipment is in, now it's just a matter of getting the details done — finish painting the walls, the handrails along the hallways, the carpet laid, and other miscellaneous things.

"We were in definite need of a renovation," said Ryan Stover, Chief Financial Officer of the hospital.

The new physical therapy area is at least twice as big as what it used to be, with new equipment. There are traditional treadmills and stationary bicycles; weights; stair steppers; an off-the-floor exercise mat; a Re-Bounder, which is a small trampoline set at an angle for medicine balls to be bounced against and caught and the NuStep, which is like a sitting stair climber, useful for people with hip injuries.

Also new are the four private exam and treatment rooms. Before, there was one large room where beds were kept separated by curtains. The staff is very proud of the individual rooms.

One room even includes a whirlpool. It is used for cleansing wounds and increasing circulation of the lower and upper extremities.

The gym now has up-to-date equip-

ment, and they will soon be adding an elliptical machine for low impact exercise.

Employees of the hospital are welcome to use the gym for wellness, which is open five days a week. They may be getting in more equipment for employees to use, but first they have to make sure there's enough room and that it won't affect patient care.

Also new is the TeleMeds room, a way for patients in Norton County, via the internet and a webcam, to converse with doctors also hooked up for tele-conferences. There is a new conference room/ education center, and a new board room, all in the basement of the hospital.

Mr. Stover is happy with the work that has been done, and would like to thank the general contractors, The Murray Company, and the local sub-contractors, Garrett's Plumbing, Heating and Electric, Norton Glass, both out of Norton, and Gardine Contractors from Nebraska, who have worked hard to get the renovations done. "They've done a very nice job," he said.

The renovations were financed from the hospital's reserve fund. Originally, it was thought that it would cost about \$496,000 to do, but with architect's fees and various other odds and ends figured in, it's going to end up totaling \$550,000.
