Mrs. Stark has been sewing since she was 8 years old, and quilting has been more than just a hobby for the past 10 years. Mrs. Wentz handles the more technological side of the business. She is better at using computers and is working on the store's website, and has been sewing since she was 8 years old, though she is only a beginning quilter.

> The front of the store is the retail part, where people can choose from a variety of fabrics for their sewing and quilting needs, or they can purchase quilts made by Mrs. Stark.

At the end of October, they are thinking of starting quilting classes, and possibly basic sewing and garment, if there is enough interest — which will take place in the middle of the store. The classes will be for both beginner and expert quilters, adults and children.

The long arm quilter will go in the back of the store.

Mrs. Stark said, "I've taught sewing for so long, I can teach anyone how to do it - even boys." In general, her junior high sewing classes have been about 50 percent boys.

The store will also be offering embroidery on throws and quilts, and to transfer photos onto them as well.

The longest project Mrs. Stark has worked on is a Sunbonnet Sue quilt she started a month after her daughter, Mrs. Wentz, was born. Four generations have worked on that quilt - Mrs. Stark, her mother, Mrs. Wentz, and Mrs. Wentz's sons. It has grown from a crib-sized quilt to a queen size, and has taken 35 years to complete.

"We have a very good working relationship," said Mrs. Wentz. "We each have different skills, and it takes both of us to run this business."

"Both of our husbands have been supportive of our business all the way," they agreed.

"My grandsons, Wyatt, Quentin and Bryndon have been wonderful about helping," said Mrs. Stark. Mrs. Wentz agreed, adding, "They've helped move furniture and re-label fabric, and they've

always been willing to help us out."

For now, they have finished with remodeling the building, but the displays and nick-knacks will be constantly changing.
