Carrie Charlotte Clydesdale

Carrie Charlotte Clydesdale, daughter of William J. and Mary (Florence) Clydesdale, was born March 5, 1908, east of Lenora and passed away at the Andbe Home in Norton, on Sept. 30, 2008, at the age of 100.

She grew up in the Lenora area and graduated from the Lenora High School with the class of 1927. She also attended business school in Topeka. While in Topeka, she worked for a family caring for their young son.

Carrie moved with the family to Utah, but returned to Kansas shortly thereafter. She helped her parents on the farm and cared for them until their deaths. She worked at the Andbe Home for two years but had to quit due to health reasons.

After that she became a caregiver for others in their own homes. She retired around 1970, and traveled to Florida and California. In 2001, she be-

came a resident of the Andbe Home where she lived until her death.

She was a member of the Rebekah Lodge and the Norton Christian Church where she enjoyed helping prepare funeral dinners.

Survivors include her sister-in-law, Doris Clydesdale, Norton, three nieces, one nephew, five great-nieces, six great-nephews, 11 great-great-nieces, seven great-great-nephews, and other relatives and friends.

She was preceded in death by her parents and three brothers, Russell, Albert, and Leonard.

The funeral service was held this morning at 10 a.m. at the Enfield Funeral Home, Norton.

Burial was in the Lenora South Cemetery.

Harvest storage important

As we approach fall, many gardens have been harvested and now must be stored for later use. Harvesting at the right time is important but storing produce properly is vital to keep that garden freshness.

To ensure high quality produce, select only the best fruits and vegetables for storage; discard the rest or use them quickly. Handle produce carefully since bruising can reduce storage life and break the "skin" of products, allowing diseases to start. Check produce in storage regularly and discard any items that have begun to deteriorate.

A refrigerator set at 35 to 50 degrees F. provides cold storage for small quantities of fruits and vegetables. Vegetable or "crisper" drawers provide slightly warmer storage than the main part of the refrigerator. If moist storage is indicated, use plastic bags to hold in moisture. Some gardeners buy old refrigerators for this purpose; automatic defrost models remove

moisture, so manual defrost types are better.

When cool storage is indicated, a basement or cellar storage area is convenient. Provide a thermostatically controlled heat source where a danger of freezing temperatures exists. Many Kansas farmsteads have an outdoor cellar-shelter that is ideal for storing produce. Pits or buried containers can also be used.
