

Teen's body found Monday morning

The Norton Police Department was dispatched to Norton Outdoor Power and Performance at 111 S. Second on Monday morning. Purpose of the call, according to authorities, was discovery of the body identified as Elliott Scott Conard, 18, Norton. Mr. Conard was a 2008 graduate of Northern Valley High School. The body was taken to Enfield Funeral Home. The cause of death is pending an autopsy.

A collision Monday morning on Highway 383 near Long Island, involving a school bus and car, resulted in the death of the car's driver, according to authorities.

Amanda Turman, 18, the accident report says, was driving east on the highway and the school bus was westbound, when she apparently lost control of the to the site. vehicle and went left of center, striking the bus head-on. Her car ended up facing west in the east bound lanes and the bus

ended up facing west in the north ditch, George Griffith. the accident report said. Brian Shearer was driving the Northern Valley/Long Island exchange, carrying 20 students to the Northern Valley Elementary School and High School in Almena.

According to the Kansas Highway Patrol, the accident occurred two and a half miles southwest of Long Island, and an accident reconstruction team was sent

"Mr. Shearer's driving skills are the only thing that saved the students' lives,' said Northern Valley Superintendent

The only high school student on the bus had minor cuts and bruises. That same high school student, whose name cannot be released because she is a minor, helped all the elementary students off the bus and used her cell phone to call 911.

"The student should be commended for helping the elementary kids get off the bus. She really stepped up to the plate when it counted the most," said Superintendent Griffith.

The driver and the bus monitor Joyce Rogers were both badly shaken, and taken

to Norton County Hospital, treated and released for minor injuries.

Twenty students on the bus were taken to a make-shift triage in the Long Island Community Center. No student had major injuries, mostly just bumps and bruises, and they were scared. Of those 20 students, 15 went home with their parents.

Mr. Griffith said because the collision was a traumatic experience, and Ms. Turman was a recent graduate of the high school, grief counselors were available at the Northern Valley and Long Island schools Monday.



Big new fire truck rolls into Norton

It has taken about six years, but District #2 of the Norton County Rural Fire Department finally watched their brand new fire truck pull into the station late Monday morning.

The truck, a 2008 T800 Kenworth tandem axle, was custom built in South Dakota. "I think it took about four to five months to build," said Chairman of the District #2 Rural Fire Department Phil Loughry.

"The Hays Fire Department helped truck," said Mr. Loughry.

plied for the grant to get the new truck and when it was built, the Federal Emergency Management Agency changed some of their requirements for the fire trucks. The original price of the truck was \$241,214, and the fire department was to pay \$12,060. Because of the requirement changes, the fire department ended up paying and extra \$2,000.

The rural fire department only has one pumper truck, a 1977 Dodge that can pump 350 gallons per minute. It has to be sold as part of the grant approval.

The new truck pumps up to 1,000 galmake recommendations for the new fire lons per minute, it has foams for Type A and Type B chemical fires, and can spray Between the time they originally ap- both water and foam at the same time.

truck engine, giving the pump more horse power to fight fires.

"There is more storage for equipment in the new truck. With the old truck, there wasn't enough room for everything, and we'd have to take out more than one truck just to hold all the equipment," said Mr. Loughry.

All of the equipment in the other trucks will be transferred to the new truck so it will be the only one that has to be taken out.

The new truck has a collapsible tank unit, which can be removed from the side of the truck, filled in less than a minute, and left for another truck to pump out of

The pump engine is separate from the while the new truck goes to refill; or if the fire is burning too hot to have the truck close to, the collapsible tank can be safely placed where the truck would normally be parked.

> There is a hard pump attachment that can be dropped into a water source such as a pond or tank, and a mount for a gun-type sprayer - which can spray both foam and water 300 feet away.

All employees of the rural fire department have completed a firemen's driving safety course to be able to drive the new truck.

"This is such a huge asset to our fire fighters and the safety of our communities," said Mr. Loughry.
