Blankets warm the patients

bleroux@nwkansas.com The Norton County Hospital, through the Jean Spires Memorial, has received 21 new lap blankets for their patients.

This past February, Jean Spires — who had worked at the Norton County Hospital for more than 30 years – passed away. Her daughter Linda Carter wanted to do something to help the patients at the hospital where her mother had worked and spent her last days.

"I wanted to be able to give the patients comfort and warmth," said Mrs. Carter

She brought the memorial money to Rich Miller, the hospital administrator, and told him of her idea to buy blankets for the patients. He told Pam Cuthbertson, the Information Technology Supervisor, about the idea. Mrs. Cuthbertson, a member of the Heritage Quilt Club, took the idea to her club, and everyone jumped on the idea to make the blankets instead of buying them. In June, during a trip to Salina, Jackie Rutherford and Regina Stark purchased the yards and yards of fleece they needed to make the blankets and, in August, the Heritage Quilt Club sat down to make the blankets. "It took us 3 hours to make 21 blankets," said Mrs. Rutherford. "Some ladies trimmed, some sewed, some turned. We were set for it to take all day, and we were done by noon. Everyone was surprised at how fast it went," said Mrs. Rutherford. There are 10 blankets for male patients, 11 blankets for female patients, and all of them can be used for children. The blankets are made of fleece, and are double-sided. One side is patterned, the other is a solid color, and no two blankets are the same. The blankets were donated to the hospital in August.
