# Farm Service Agency holding election

The Norton County Farm Service Agency County Committee elections will be held by mail ballot for Local Administrative Area 2. Only producers who live in or own land in that administrative area will be voting.

The ballots are due in the agency office or must be postmarked by Dec. 1. The position to be filled is currently held by Ivan Kingham. Mr. Kingham is eligible for re-election. The term will begin Jan. 1, 2009 and will be for a three-year period.

Candidates for the election are Melinda Harting, Ivan Kingham and Linda Esslinger. Those voting in the administrative area are reminded of the following:

- Voter must sign the certification on the ballot envelope before returning to the office.
- A power of attorney may NOT be used to vote in the elec-
- Ballots must be returned to the office or post-marked by Dec. 1, 2008.
- Voter can only vote for one candidate.

Producers in the administrative area are encouraged to take an active role in the upcoming election and vote for the candidate of their choice. Remember the committee represents you, according to the Farm Service Agency office. .

Board tables baseball proposal

Mr. Miller was given 10 minutes to present his findings on other area schools that have baseball and softball programs. After his 10 minutes were up, the board (with board vice-president Jeff Nielsen voting no) tabled the discussion until the December meeting. There has been a push for a couple of years now to bring both baseball and softball into the school's athletic program.

Superintendent Greg Mann said the second restitution check for the football field damage had been received. The check was for the amount of \$845.91.

The Leadership Norton class met in the board room on Wednesday for lunch and invited the board members to join them. Board member Mark Keilig is in the Leadership Norton class, and board member Nielsen volunteered to attend.

A consultant from Educational Services and Staff Development Association of Central Kansas has been hired to work with the staff on strategies for state assessments

during the January In-service. Utilities and fuel costs continued to be lower than last year at this time but are expected to start increasing. Eisenhower Elementary 5th and 6th grades are being recognized for state assessment reading results. Permission had been given to have play practice on Wednesday night. Mr. Mann said the state funding is not looking good and they need to be prepared for cuts to the school

budgets. Mirla Coleman, Social Studies curriculum representative, gave a presentation regarding the teaching of financial literacy in the Norton schools which she made last May to the Kansas State Board of Edu-

Jim Jackson, transportation director, was present for the discussion of purchasing a new handicap bus. Superintendent Mann recommended to the board that a bus not be purchased at this time. The board voted to reject all bids.

Keith Hauser, technology curriculum representative, gave a demonstration to the board on how to have interactive white boards in each classroom for significant savings over purchasing the boards. Using a laptop, an infrared pen, a Nintendo Wii remote and a ceilingmounted projector, a white board can be used in the same way as a touch-screen computer. Teachers will be able to do anything on the white board that can be done on a computer or laptop, with the entire class being able to view what's being done. Several school systems have already developed programs for interactive white boards for free use.


The board went into executive session and returned to open meeting at 8:48 p.m., and then went into executive session again and returned to open meeting at 9:03 p.m.
